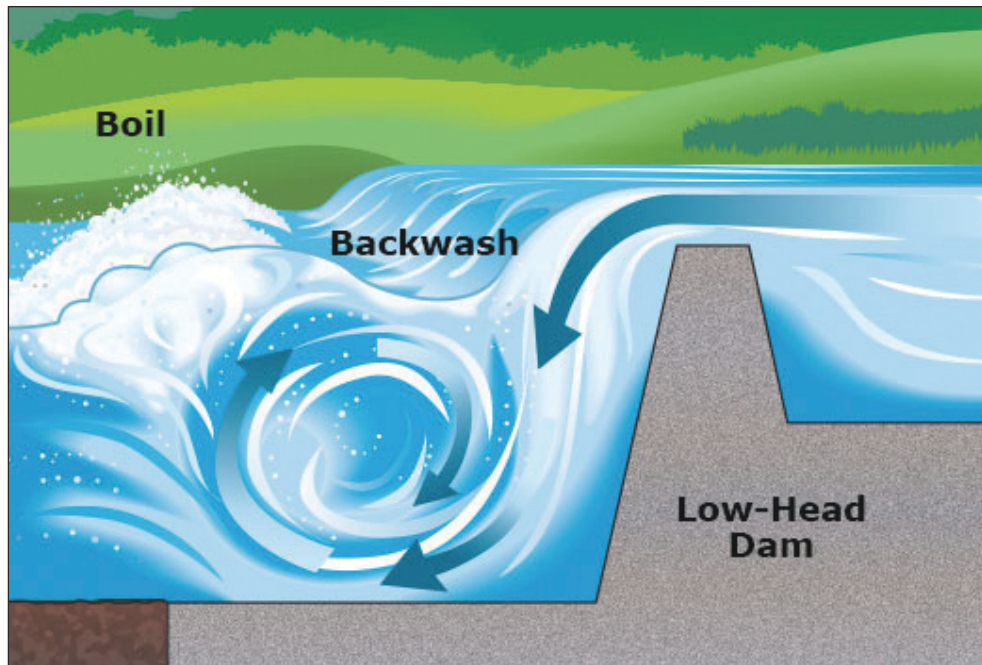
Deluge means danger at low-head dams

Local water rescuers move into action during storms

GARNETT —Recent storms which have dumped nearly 7 inches of rain over the last two weeks have brought reminders of the dangers of flooding, and Anderson County's new Water Rescue Team has been activated to help recover at least one drowning victim in the area.

An Iola man died Saturday, Aug. 3, while inner tubing with friends in Elm Creek south of Iola. Water Rescue Team members from Harris, Welda, Colony and Garnett were called to help find the man. Crews searched along one mile of rushing water in the creek and a smaller tributary for about 17 hours, and the man's body was found Aug. 4 near the basin of a low-head dam.

The recent rains have caused flooding throughout the state, especially in

southern Anderson County, Emergency Management Director J.D. Mersman said.

How healthy?

High health insurance costs lead county to debate wellness

GARNETT — Increasing health insurance costs could force some county employees to drop out of the county's plan, sparking discussion on the benefits of developing a wellness plan at last week's Anderson County Commission meeting.

At their Aug. 5 meeting, county commissioners and other county leaders discussed options on the county's health insurance plan. Commissioners had sought quotes from various insurance providers, but so far

only health insurance provider Aetna has submitted quotes.

Various options were provided by Aetna, with varying deductibles and other options, but in the end most of the options would result in increased costs either to employees, to the county, or to both.

Sheriff Vern Valentine, who attended the meeting to discuss other issues, said he was concerned that his lower-income employees would drop the county's health insurance plan because of the potential increased costs. A family plan costs about \$700 per month, which amounts to about 25 percent of income for some employees, he said.

K-State Extension could merge in consolidation

Grouping county programs in district could cost less

GARNETT — Leaders of Anderson County's Extension Office say they're in favor of joining two other counties in an Extension District that would provide more programs and cost less for county taxpayers.

Shannon Blocker, an agent with the K-State Research and Extension office in Anderson County, said she sent a letter requesting a meeting with the Frontier District to begin discussion on possibly joining the

district. The Frontier District was formed in 2010 by extension departments in Osage and Franklin counties.

The consolidation of extension districts has become a trend since the 1990s as counties have sought to save money and increase opportunities by combining resources. Staff members can specialize in particular fields, spreading out responsibilities and increasing expertise, Blocker told county commissioners at an Aug. 5 meeting. The Frontier District currently has five extension agents between the two counties; if Anderson County were to join the district, that number

Veterans memorial work slows

Debate arises about theme of memorial pegged for square

GARNETT — Plans to bring a veterans memorial to the Anderson County Courthouse lawn have stalled over debate on just who should be recognized by the memorial. Should the memorial honor only those who have died, or all veterans?

That question is one sticking point for a committee of seven people attempting to

bring the memorial to the courthouse lawn, county clerk Phyllis Gettler told commissioners recently. The debate has created some delay for the project.

Plans for a veterans memorial began more than a year ago, and since then have faced several delays as opinions about the project vary. In addition to the debate over who should be honored by the memorial, some have disagreed about the best location and what type of memorial would be built.

Plans for the memorial have been in the works

for a couple of years, and commissioners added a line item in the budget last year to allow for it. The idea of a memorial grew out of construction on the county jail, when its architect said he could design a memorial for the courthouse lawn. But that's about as far as the memorial has gotten. Estimates have suggested the memorial could be in the \$40,000-\$50,000 range.

Gettler said the committee also would like to establish some type of fundraiser to help pay for the memorial, but no official plans have yet been announced.

last week after a vehicle became stranded in water on K-31 near the railroad track bridge east of Kincaid. The motorist was able to get himself and his vehicle out of the dangerous waters before rescue workers arrived, Mersman said.

Several other county roads have been flooded during heavy rain showers, Mersman said. He advises anyone who comes across a flooded road to find an alternate route, rather than attempting to drive through the road.

"Turn around and don't drown. That's the advice we're giving now," Mersman said.

The recent rains have dumped about 6.85 inches over the area since Aug. 1. Typical rainfall for the month of August is 4.61 inches. Temperatures have been unseasonably cool, with an average high temperature this month of 81.8 and an average low of 66. Thunderstorms continued Monday and more storms were expected today and tonight, clearing up the rest of the week.

The county's new water rescue team was formed earlier this year and has proved beneficial in several situations, Mersman said. Crews have been called to assist in emergencies throughout the region, but the team will be most helpful in the event of a local water emergency.

"Having the appropriate training and equipment is critical when you have someone trapped in rising waters," Mersman said. "These are time sensitive situations, and there's a lot of value in having responders locally."

Josh DeHoux, Anderson County's Natural Resource Officer with the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, was part of the team that responded to the Iola incident. He said the victim and two friends floated over a low-head dam and became separated from their inner tubes. Two of the men were able to swim to the shore, but the third was lost in the dangerous hydraulic created by rushing water at the base of the low-head dam.

Low-head dams are particu-

larly dangerous, although they make popular areas to fish, picnic and swim, DeHoux said. A low-head dam is an area along any flowing body of water where there is an obstruction in flow. At times of low flow, the water will pool behind the barrier. When water levels and flow cause the current to go over the dam, a deadly and nearly invisible under current occurs. This current will trap people, boats, cars and anything that gets into its grip. Escape is nearly impossible and death is almost certain unless trained responders reach the victim in time, DeHoux said.

There are about a half dozen low-head dams on waterways in Anderson County, DeHoux said. Even more can be found within a 30 minute drive, and some have developed nicknames like "Drowning Machine" for a dam in Wilson County that has killed 10 people.

"Low head dams in this area alone have been attributed to several boat accidents, swift water rescues, and a variety of critical injuries in the past few

months," DeHoux said. "2013 is becoming one of the worst years for drowning deaths in recent history."

The Federal Emergency Management Agency, FEMA, offers tips for people in flooding situations.

—Listen to your radio or television for information.

—Be aware that flash flooding can occur. If there is any possibility of a flash flood that could affect you, move immediately to higher ground. Do not wait for instructions to move. If in your vehicle, Turn Around, Don't Drown.

—Be aware of streams, drainage channels, canyons, and other areas known to flood suddenly. Flash floods can occur in these areas with or without such typical warnings as rain clouds or heavy rain.

—United Way's 2-1-1 is a helpful resource before, during and after disasters. Keeping this number and an up-to-date family communication plan handy is a must-do when preparing for emergencies.

inception more than a year ago.

Project 17 is the nickname for the "Together We Succeed: Southeast Kansas Economic Improvement Initiative." The program grew out of Kansas State University's Advanced Manufacturing Institute and the Kansas Chamber of Commerce.

The goal of Project 17 is to create and sustain well-paid jobs in advanced manufacturing and other sectors in southeast Kansas. The initiative will involve local stakeholders throughout the region who will develop a strategic plan that identifies opportunities for investment and economic development assets in the region and then will link those opportunities and assets to businesses and other resources in the area.

The counties involved in Project 17 are Allen, Anderson, Bourbon, Chautauqua, Cherokee, Coffey, Crawford, Elk, Franklin, Greenwood, Labette, Linn, Miami, Montgomery, Neosho, Wilson and Woodson. "Southeast Kansas has suf-

fered greatly in the recession," said State Sen. Jeff King of Independence, one of the key leaders of the Project 17 initiative. "Only by working together for local solutions can our region create the jobs we need to get people back to work in southeast Kansas. It could help to develop some sort of wellness plan for the county, commissioners said. However, to develop a wellness plan through Aetna would require hiring an on-site wellness coordinator. "Get Healthy" programs could save the county about \$600 per year per employee who participates, according to the Aetna plan.

About a year ago, the county approved paying membership fees for employees who wanted to use the Garnett Recreation Center. Since then, however, only a handful of employees

actually have taken advantage of that offer, County Clerk Phyllis Gettler said. Commissioner Jim Johnson said he would like to encourage more people to use the program, especially employees who have health issues like obesity or smoking.

Discussion on health insurance coverage likely is expected to continue at future meetings, as the commission seeks bids from other health insurance companies.

would increase to seven.

"The benefits are extremely numerous to Anderson County," Blocker said. "Currently there are two agents in this county to cover a wide berth of information. We try to be experts in a wide range of things and this is challenging. You can only do so many things well."

Joining the district would have tax benefits as well, Blocker said. The extension district is a separate taxing authority, similar to a school board.

Currently, the nine-member extension executive board prepares a budget and submits it to the county commission for approval. Funding for the county's extension department is part of the county's general budget. If the extension department is consolidated with the other counties, it would no longer be funded solely by Anderson County, but instead by the larger district itself which would have its own mill levy.

Blocker estimated Anderson County taxpayers would see a small tax decrease because its extension services would combine with Franklin and Osage counties, which have lower taxes. She estimated that the owner of a \$100,000 house would see taxes decrease by about \$6 per year.

If the county were to join the

district, four people would be elected to a district board that would oversee management of the district activities and budget. The current nine-member extension executive board and a 24-member council would become advisory committees and would offer recommendations without having budget responsibilities.

There could be other savings because of the consolidation of resources, although travel expenses would increase because agents would need to travel to Osage and Franklin counties.

The change likely would not make much of a difference to the county fair, because that is handled by a separate fair board, she said.

Blocker stressed that the discussion is still in its early stages, and more details will become known after she meets with other representatives, perhaps later this month and in September. If it is not possible to consolidate with the Frontier District, it is possible that Miami and Linn counties could form a district at some point, and Anderson County join that district instead. However, Anderson County's extension office and county residents in general typically have more interaction with Franklin County, she said.

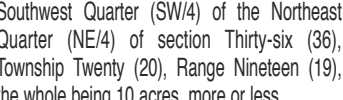

Retiree income is highest in county; gives hints to local businesses

If we know what's good for us in Anderson County, we ought to be rolling out the red carpet for Grandma and Grandpa.

Even though it's an accepted fact that retirees make up a big chunk of the county's personal income, that economic fact begs re-illustrating in view of the latest economic review of the county and from where its buying power comes. The data should be a clear reminder to local businesses and entrepreneurs that targeting goods and services to retirees has great promise in Anderson County.

In fact in 2009, pensions, social security, dividends and other income generated by retirees in Anderson County totaled more than \$108 million, up \$15 million dollars from 2000. The next closest category of personal income was government employment – city, county, state, school and other tax-supported jobs – at \$24.3 million. Retiree income in the county is more than four times that of the next closest personal income category.

So beyond traditional manufacturing jobs or the modern fantasy of recruiting techno-focused or call center jobs to our community, the county's real economic bread and butter is that group of residents in their 60s and older, because they bring in by far more personal income to the county than any other category of jobs or employment.

The fact has dawned on communities all across the country who are now actively campaigning to recruit retirees to become residents of their towns. The City of Lawrence last January commissioned a local marketing company to the tune of \$34,000 to come up with a marketing campaign aimed at recruiting retirees to Larryville. That company estimated the marketing effort would require an investment of \$60,000-\$80,000 in advertising and marketing efforts. Clearly, Lawrence wants what Anderson County already has.

The hint is clear to local businesses and the entrepreneurial types looking for a new start-up opportunity: find a way to be "retiree friendly" with your product or service. That means putting an emphasis on add-ons like home delivery and keeping in mind most retirees either have or will shortly downsize their living accommodations. Reminder and other "keep in touch" programs for auto service or HVAC system maintenance, for instance, help retain customers who need such services but have no intention of performing them in a do-it-yourself basis.

Businesses that develop those retiree-friendly practices will bolster themselves with good paying customers and help their towns attract more retirees once their town's level of "retiree focus" gets passed along to those who are soon to retire.

Reforming the Prison-Industrial Complex

Prison is one of the most important institutions in American life. About a quarter of all the world's prisoners are behind bars in the United States, a total of roughly 2 million people. It costs about \$60 billion a year to imprison them.

This vast prison-industrial complex has succeeded in reducing crime but is a blunt instrument. Prison stays often constitute a graduate seminar in crime, and at the very least, the system does a poor job preparing prisoners to return to the real world. Since 95 percent of prisoners will eventually be released, this is not a minor problem.

In an essay in the journal *National Affairs*, Eli Lehrer sets out an agenda for reform geared toward rehabilitation, and the conservative group *Right on Crime* advocates a similar program.

Most fundamentally, prisoners should be required to do what many of them have never done before, namely an honest day's work. Fewer than a third of offenders hold full-time jobs at the time of their arrest, according to Lehrer. They won't acquire a work ethic in prison. University of Pennsylvania Law School professor Stephanos Bibas notes that only about 8 percent of prisoners work in prison industries, and about 4 percent on prison farms.

Labor unions and businesses have long supported restrictions on productive work by prisoners for fear of cheap competition, but their self-interested concerns shouldn't obstruct attempts to instill the most basic American norm in people desperately in need of it. Prisoners should be made to work, but be paid for it and rewarded if they

are particularly diligent and skilled. As Bibas argues, some of the proceeds can go to restitution for victims, to paying for their own upkeep, and to support for their families.

Lehrer notes that about 40 percent of ex-prisoners are rearrested within three years. The goal should be to reduce recidivism as much as possible. Offenders shouldn't be discharged without a photo ID. In the job market, they shouldn't be denied occupational licenses when the job in question has nothing to do with their crime. They should, if their crime wasn't too serious, eventually have it expunged from the records for most purposes.

Ex-inmates out on parole or on probation should be monitored more closely. As Lehrer writes, "Transition programs should increasingly involve random, unannounced home visits, subject offenders to round-the-clock electronic monitoring, require them to take random drug tests, and offer them swift and certain punishment for slip-ups."

Playing against type, hang-'em-high Texas has been a model of prison reform and innovative re-entry programs. It has sent fewer people to prison, while crime has continued to decline in the state. It has funded more slots for treatment for substance abuse and mental illness, and increased the use of drug courts, creating alternatives to prison. It has strengthened supervision of probationers and parolees, by reducing caseloads for officers and fashioning a system of swift and certain sanctions for violations.

We have proved that we can lock a lot of people up. The challenge now is if we can do it more humanely and intelligently and, ultimately, create less work for the prison-industrial complex.

Is zero-based budgeting worth a try?

There's a request to the Kansas Legislative Coordinating Council—the business side of running the Legislature—for a much talked-about but never tried study of state government.

It's called zero-based budgeting, and it has not been sought on a reasonable scale before.

What's that? It is virtually dismantling for budget purposes a state agency and seeing what the agency is charged to do by state law, and what it spends to do it.

This year, Senate Ways and Means Chair Ty Masterson, R-Andover, says he'd like to zero-base budget an agency or two, not the whole state, just an agency or two to see whether the agency is doing what it is supposed to do, and whether it is doing it in the most cost-efficient manner.

It's a little like creating a brand new agency. Toss aside all the stuff that is done by tradition, all the programs that historically have been done because, well, the agency always has done them.

You just look at what the agency is supposed to be doing under state law and what resources in terms of people and money it takes to do it. No history, no tradition, just starting from zero to do what

the agency is supposed to do.

Does that sound a little simplistic? Probably, but it also sounds a little businesslike.

Practically, state government, as administrations change and new department secretaries are appointed, do about what they did in the past under previous administrations because most of the workers in agencies stay there through changes in administration. That's just how it is.

That storehouse of knowledge, tradition and how-we-do-it-here is an asset, but it also deters change for better or worse. Yet sometimes you need an old-timer in an agency to tell you what works and what doesn't.

KHP participates in DUI crackdown, traffic enforcement

The Kansas Highway Patrol will be joining other local law enforcement agencies from across Kansas to work extra hours during the You Drink. You Drive. You Lose. Special Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP). The STEP campaign runs from August 15, through the Labor Day weekend, until September 2. The additional enforcement efforts are underwritten by a grant from the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT). During STEP, there will be additional enforcement of

all Kansas traffic laws, with particular focus on impaired driving laws.

If you are involved in a crash in which alcohol is a contributing factor, according to KDOT, you are two-and-one-half (2 1/2) times more likely to be injured and four-and-one-half (4 1/2) times more likely to be seriously injured or killed, than if you were in a crash in which alcohol was not a factor. The ratio of death to injury in alcohol-related crashes is almost four times higher than the death to injury

ratio for non-alcohol related crashes.

"The last thing we want to investigate on our highways is a fatality crash involving someone's family member. We hope that everyone will remember to designate a sober driver, not just this weekend, but all of the time," Colonel Ernest E. Garcia, superintendent of the Kansas Highway Patrol, said.

"Troopers and other officers will be out in force over the next few weeks, and we hope this contributes to a

safer time for all of those utilizing our Kansas roads."

Over the 2012 Labor Day holiday reporting period for the Patrol (KHP stats only), troopers worked four fatal crashes on Kansas' highways, resulting in four deaths. One of the fatal crashes was alcohol-related. There were four total impaired driving crashes worked by KHP. The Patrol arrested 39 people for impaired driving. Personnel also assisted 1,193 motorists who needed help on Kansas roads. The reporting

period for the Labor Day 2012 weekend ran during a portion of the STEP period, and ran from 6:00 p.m. the Friday prior to the holiday, through midnight the Monday of the holiday.

The men and women of the Kansas Highway Patrol hope that everyone has a safe Labor Day holiday weekend. If you need assistance on a Kansas highway, or if you suspect an impaired driver, the Patrol asks that you call *47 (*HP) for KHP dispatch, or *582 (*KTA) if you are on the Turnpike.

KDHE reminds parents, caregivers of required vaccines for students

TOPEKA - Kansas immunization school requirements are designed to protect all children against vaccine-preventable diseases. The 2013-2014 kindergarten through 12th grade school immunization requirements and recommendations are based on the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommendations and the consensus of the Governor's Child Health Advisory Committee Immunization Workgroup.

The 2013-2014 school required immunizations are:

- Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis (DTaP): Five doses required. A single dose of Tdap is required at Grades 7-12 if no previous history of Tdap vaccination regardless of interval since the last Td.
- Polio (IPV/OPV): Four doses required. One dose required after age 4 regardless of the number of previous doses, with a 6 month mini-

mum interval from the previous dose.

- Measles, Mumps, Rubella: two doses required.
- Hepatitis B: three doses required through grade 12.
- Varicella (chickenpox): two doses required for grades K-4 and 7-9; one dose required for grades 5-6 and 10-12 unless history of Varicella disease documented by a licensed physician.

"Vaccination saves the lives

and prevents others from suffering from diseases and permanent disabilities. If children aren't vaccinated, they can spread disease to other children who are too young to be vaccinated or whose medical condition prevents them from being vaccinated," said Brenda Walker, director of disease control and prevention at the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. "Because almost all parents vaccinate

their children in the United States, we all derive protection from 'community immunity.' Children are best protected if they are vaccinated."

In addition to the immunizations required for school entry listed above, the 2013 ACIP recommendations also include the following for school children:

- Meningococcal (MCV4): one dose recommended at 11 years with a booster dose at 16 yrs of age; not required for

school entry.

- Human Papillomavirus (HPV): three doses recommended for males and females at 11 years of age; not required for school entry.

• Influenza: yearly vaccination recommended for all ages 6 months and above; not required for school entry.

First human West Nile virus positive case reported in Kansas for 2013

TOPEKA - The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) has announced the first reported case of West Nile virus for 2013. The individual that tested positive is an adult from Atchison County. KDHE has also learned of the first West Nile virus positive mosquito sample in Kansas for 2013. The positive mosquito sample was collected from Sedgwick County.

West Nile virus can be spread to people through bites from infected mosquitoes, but it is not contagious from person to person. Symptoms range from a slight headache and low-grade fever to swelling of the brain or brain tissue and in

rare cases, death. People who have had West Nile virus before are considered immune.

KDHE recommends the following precautions to protect against West Nile virus:

- When you are outdoors, use insect repellent containing an EPA-registered active ingredient on skin and clothing, including DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or IR3535. Follow the directions on the package.
- Many mosquitoes are most active at dusk and dawn. Be sure to use insect repellent and wear long sleeves and pants at these times or consider staying indoors during these hours.
- Make sure you have good

screens on your windows and doors to keep mosquitoes out.

- Get rid of mosquito breeding sites by emptying standing water from flower pots, buckets and barrels. Change the water in pet dishes and replace the water in bird baths weekly. Drill holes in tire swings so water drains out. Keep children's wading pools empty and

on their sides when they aren't being used.

West Nile virus cases are most common in the late summer and early fall months. In 2012, there were 57 cases of West Nile virus in Kansas, the most cases since the virus first made its way into the state in 2002. In addition to tracking cases of human illnesses caused by

West Nile virus, KDHE assesses the potential for West Nile virus by conducting limited mosquito surveillance, including laboratory testing.

Birds are not tested for West Nile virus in Kansas and KDHE will not be collecting information about dead birds. If you find a dead bird, KDHE recommends that you wear gloves,

place the bird in a plastic bag, and dispose of it in the garbage.

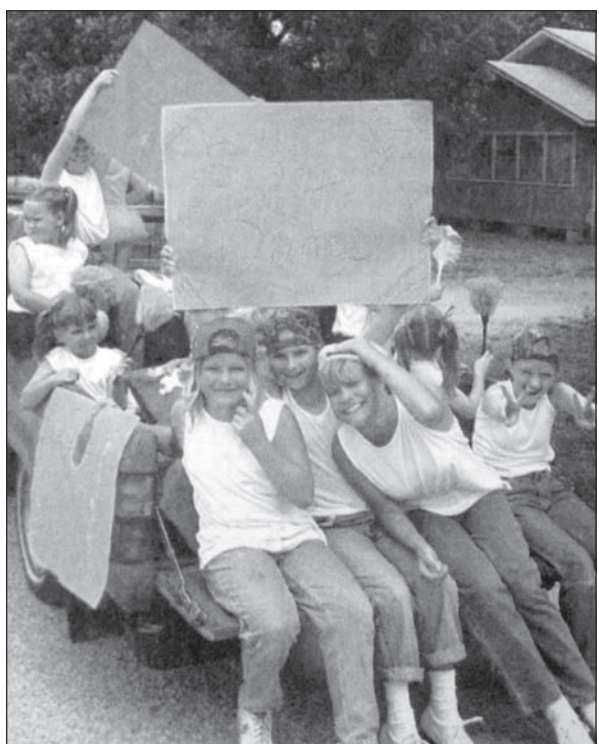

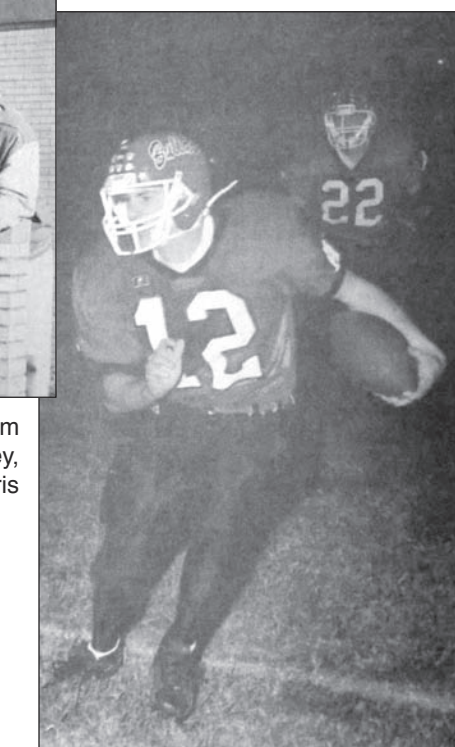

AG's office issues first roofing registration certificates, launches new online directory

TOPEKA - The first roofing contractors to be registered with the Kansas attorney general's office under a new law enacted this year by the Legislature are now listed online, Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt announced last week.

The new Kansas Roofing Contractor Registration Act is aimed at helping consumers avoid doing business with unscrupulous or fly-by-night operators who do not comply with registration requirements.

The law took effect July 1, and the attorney general's office has completed processing the first group of 17 applications.

"We have quickly implemented the new roofing registration system under the guidelines established by the legislature," Schmidt said. "Our staff is working hard to efficiently process the registration applications, and we expect to issue many more registration certificates in the coming weeks."

Certificates issued today are

for 17 roofing contractors. The list of registered roofers is now available online at www.ag.ks.gov. The attorney general's office is currently reviewing more than 300 additional applications that have been received since the law took effect on July 1. By law, the office has 60 days to review the applications. Additional roofing contractors will be added to the online directory as their applications are approved.

Under the provisions of this

law, which was enacted by the Legislature in April, on and after July 1, 2013, every "roofing contractor" must obtain a roofing contractor registration certificate from the Kansas Attorney General in order to legally provide commercial or residential roofing services for a fee in Kansas.

Roofing contractors or consumers who have additional questions may call the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division at (800) 432-2310.

Soaking rains, floods put flowers and vegetables at risk

MANHATTAN - Two facts may become bad news for the water-soaked gardens now spread across the High Plains and Midwest:

1. Every living cell in plants must have oxygen or die.

2. Garden crops exposed to flood waters that may be contaminated - particularly by animal manure, chemicals or sewage - must be treated as if they're contaminated, too.

"Most of our landscape flowers and garden vegetables have no way to provide oxygen to their roots if the soil becomes saturated. They're automatically at risk when the weather is this wet," said Ward Upham, horticulturist, Kansas State University Research and Extension, referring to recent heavy rains in the nation's mid-section.

If standing or flooding water drains away within 24 hours, its impact on plant health is

usually minimal, Upham said. But, the longer plants are in saturated soils, the more likely damage becomes.

"The risk doesn't end there, either. A heavy rainfall alone is enough to make soils crust and become more compacted as they dry. This also can reduce roots' access to oxygen," he said.

Plants that remained mulched or mounded (e.g., potatoes) may have fewer problems. Still, lightly scraping soil to break up any crusting will help maintain healthy roots and, in turn, healthy plants.

"Be careful not to cultivate too deeply, though, to avoid damaging shallow roots," Upham said.

Standing water alone won't cause safety problems in garden vegetables if the plants' above-ground growth remains healthy. So long as it isn't cracked or soft, the fruit that

develops after water subsides is a safe harvest from such plants as the cucumber, sweet corn, pepper, squash and tomato.

"To err on the side of safety, discard all crops that may have been in contact with contaminated water - certainly any leafy vegetables, such as lettuce and spinach," Upham said.

"Don't keep plants that rapidly yellow, either. That can signal exposure to contaminants, as well as a lack of oxygen."

K-State to offer fire, rescue training

MANHATTAN -- Grain-related entrapment, engulfments, asphyxiations and entanglements are safety concerns for those who work on farms and in commercial grain facilities.

A first responder course for fire and rescue instructors on incidents involving grain storage, processing, and handling facilities will be held on the Kansas State University campus on Aug. 21. The Department of Grain Science and Industry is hosting the session at the International Grains Program building. The workshop is limited to individuals who are currently emergency first responders or fire-rescue instructors.

To register for the course, complete information and a registration form is at Grainnet.

The course is a joint project with Purdue University, which is also offering a class in West Lafayette, Ind. on Aug. 16. The contents of the class are based on incident data gathered by Purdue's Agricultural Safety and Health Program. The course is made possible through a Department of Labor-OSHA Susan Harwood Grant.

The workshop is limited to individuals who meet the following criteria:

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Area trail awarded grant

TOPEKA - The Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism (KDWP) has awarded \$2 million in State Trail Program grants to help fund 16 recreational trail projects around the state.

The Prairie Spirit Trail State Park was awarded a grant for \$62,386 for a mini-excavator and equipment storage facility.

The grants were made possible when the state opted out of the Federal Recreational Trails Program (FRTP) in 2012 so more funding would be available for the overall pool of transportation alternatives.

The department received more than \$5 million in grant requests for the \$2 million that was available, representing over \$7.7 million in potential investments in trails and trail ameni-

ties to improve the overall quality of life for Kansans. The State Trails Program, like the FRTP, provides for an 80/20 match of approved expenses, with the local entity supplying the 20 percent. Projects must meet accessibility and environmental criteria. Sponsoring entities are also evaluated for their ability to administer the projects and their past performance in handling similar grants.

1993: Death leads to road review

August 19, 2003

The deal expected to put Garnett Church Furnishings in the hands of three Johnson County area businessmen was expected to close yesterday, confirming for local officials and the public exactly what total in city/county funds will be required to get out of the financing arrangement that tied it to GCF since 2001. The purchase agreement got a boost late last month when the City of Garnett agreed to issue \$1.5 million in Industrial Revenue Bonds for the company, providing the remaining details in the sale with its effects on the city, buyers and sellers could be mutually agreed upon. City officials said last week they believed a workable arrangement had been achieved.

A speeding ticket or other city ordinance violation will cost the violator 300 percent more in court costs after city commissioners raised the city's court costs Tuesday. Commissioners acted on a recommendation from city attorney Terry Solander to raise the city's municipal court fees from \$10 per case to \$40 per case, after a review of the city court fees showed Garnett's costs to be significantly less than other cities and hadn't been raised in several years. Solander estimates the municipal court handles between 1,200 and 1,300 cases per year, meaning the city could generate up to an extra \$39,000 per year with the change.

Anderson County Commissioners, along with other counties in the area, hope to hear later this week that the federal government has extended the deadline imposed on landfill operators to meet new environmental standards - guidelines that have already prompted closing notices by several landfills including Anderson County's.

The recent tragic death of Garnett's DeDe Gale at an unmarked rural road has focused new attention on safety at those junctures of graveled county road. Anderson County Sheriff David Vaughan said this week that the tragedy of Gale's death should point out to county residents the importance of extreme caution at those intersections, most of which are unmarked by stop signs and sometimes obscured by high weeds, tall crops and driver complacency. Gale died Aug. 12, while running a rural mail route. Her westbound vehicle was struck broadside at a gravel road intersection by a southbound truck.

August 22, 1983

Area merchants, companies and individuals contributed \$11,931.72 to 4-H members Thursday night at the livestock sale held each year in connection with the Anderson County Fair. That was the total amount of money paid for the various animals, above the market price. Brummel Farm Service paid the largest individual premium, giving David Ratliff \$1,067.60 above the market price for his reserve champion Crossbred beef. The champion was not sold.

Marijuana plants with a value in excess of \$1,000 were found northwest of Garnett Friday by officers from the Anderson County Sheriff's Department. Sheriff Tom Hermreck said that they were tipped off by the Kansas Bureau of Investigation, who was informed of the marijuana by an informant who requested anonymity.

Charges at the Anderson County Hospital will be raised for 1984, beginning Oct. 1, 1983, but not as much as had been anticipated. Semi-private rooms will be increased \$5 per day from \$125 to \$130. Long term care daily rate will be increased \$1 per day, from \$33 to \$34. Private rooms at the hospital will go up from \$143 to \$145 per day, emergency room charges will go from \$20 to \$21 and other costs will be increased by a percentage, such as lab work.

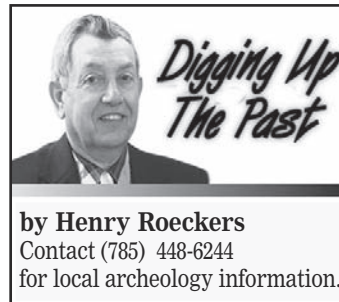

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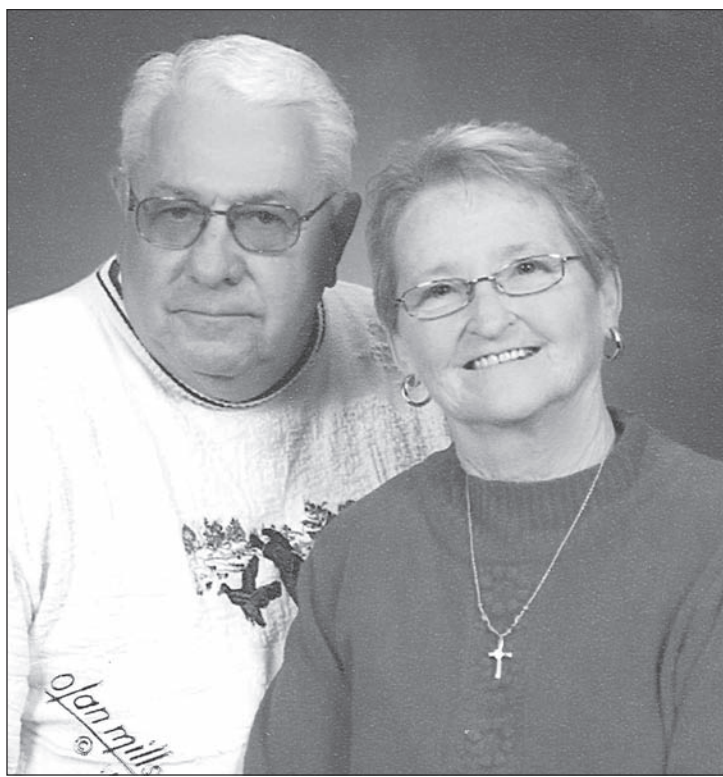

Garden for good: Inmates find peace, help community

SOUTH HUTCHINSON – On about one and one-half acres of fertile Kansas soil, neatly-kept rows of tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers, potatoes and other produce greet visitors to the Hutchinson Correctional Facility.

Welcome to the Garden for Good, where 30 inmates - trained as Kansas Master Gardeners -- find respite from the harsh realities of life behind bars.

For the past three years, this has been their labor of love. But the Garden for Good is as its name suggests: a symbol of the inmates' fierce determination to make good with themselves and the local community.

"When I'm in the garden," says inmate Keith Mathis, "I guess you could say it's a retreat, away from the animosity, away from the negativity that's inside the (prison) dorms. It's not all negativity, but there's a lot of it, because you know, you're in prison."

"But you get out here and you put something in the ground, watch it, water it and the next thing you know it's growing. You're eating it, you're taking the seeds and the next year you're planting seeds that you've harvested. It gives you a sense of pride."

In 2012, the Garden for Good donated more than 6,700 pounds of produce and \$2,500 to such community groups as the Christian soup kitchen and the food bank of Reno County. This year, the group set a goal to donate 10,000 pounds of produce, and donate \$5,000 to area groups.

"We sell (produce) to the inmates here at a price that is a little less than market value on the street, because a lot of these guys don't make very much money," said Gary Robbins, president of the garden's inmate-only board.

"We put that money back into the garden, and whatever we don't need for the garden, we donate to local groups such as the local Boys and Girls

Club, the local sexual assault center, the food bank, (and) several other places."

Doug Barr, the administrator for the prison, said that inmates came up with the idea of Garden for Good three years ago. Three inmate groups submitted a proposal in which they promised to raise their own money and do all the work.

The prison's administration approved the proposal, provided the land, and helped to set up classes with K-State Research and Extension's Master Gardeners program.

"All of us who have gone through the course are certified Kansas Master Gardeners," said Victor Mitchell, one of the garden's original members. Each year, 10-12 inmates are accepted to take the classes, which are taught inside the prison walls by volunteer Extension Master Gardeners.

Mathis likened the Master Gardener classes to a college course. He said the inmates learn how to identify good and bad garden insects; create alternatives to garden chemicals; make compost; take soil samples; and even how to use flowers that attract pests and keep them away from the produce.

"A lot of guys here have never had a garden in their life," Mitchell said. "They're probably city kids, but they're going to have something they can do with their kids and their families when they get out of here."

Barr notes that some inmates may even get a break when it comes time for a parole hearing. The Master Gardener classes are part of the prison's program to reward inmates for good behavior.

"Idle time in prison is never a good thing," he said. "This gives them an opportunity to keep themselves focused and plan toward the future."

"In a prison setting, you don't get a lot of opportunity to show that you can be productive, other than a classroom

setting. So when you come out here and look at this garden, it speaks for itself. All the hard work and dedication these guys spend each day in this garden to keep it up, it's a huge task."

Inmates typically work 8-10 hours in prison detail or, in some cases, a private industry job. Only after that do they get time to work in the garden.

The first year, before they had some operating funds, the garden work included hand watering every vegetable plant, often lugging five gallon buckets of water as much as a quarter-mile.

"I'm not going to lie," Mathis remembers, "there were times when I'm thinking to myself, 'What are you doing?' You burn up, you're hot, you're sweaty... but you start seeing the produce or you taste a tomato or taste an onion. You see Ms. Murdock from the soup kitchen and you see the smile on her face when you take her a 55-gallon trash can of tomatoes and they are happy."

"It makes you feel good about yourself."

Robbins credits the 30 inmates who currently work in the garden.

"I think the big thing is that everybody comes out and works their tails off and, every man is really sincere about our donations and what we do for the outside," he said.

"A couple of them have told me that this was the greatest single thing they've accomplished in their life. I say it's my second, because I have a son, and he's first. But this garden, other than that, might be the single greatest thing I've accomplished. And I'm proud of this more than anything else."

Adds Mathis: "When I was out on the street, I didn't do this. It gives me a tool that when I get out, to grow a garden, to help the community, to help the soup kitchen. It's about me getting better for myself, and getting better for the (community)."

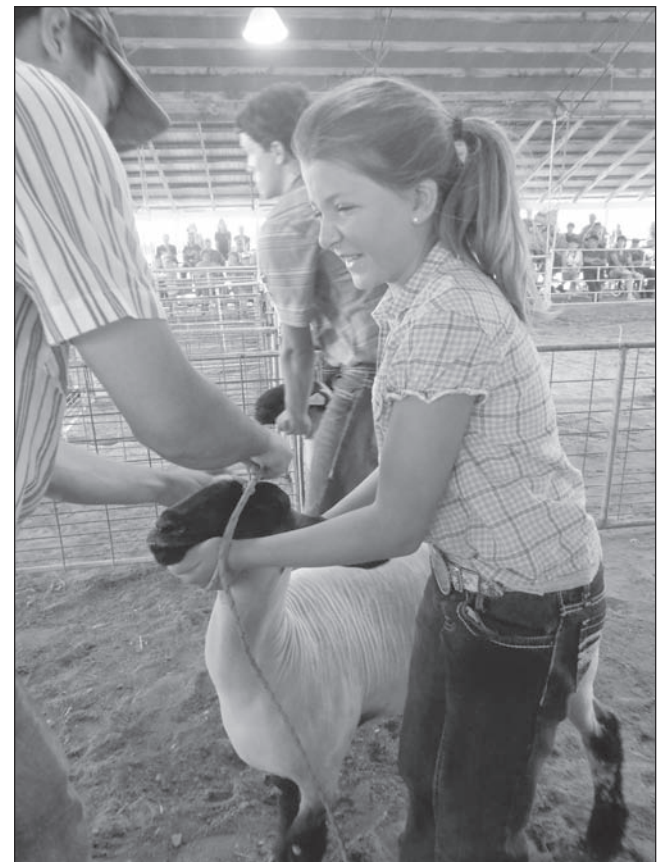

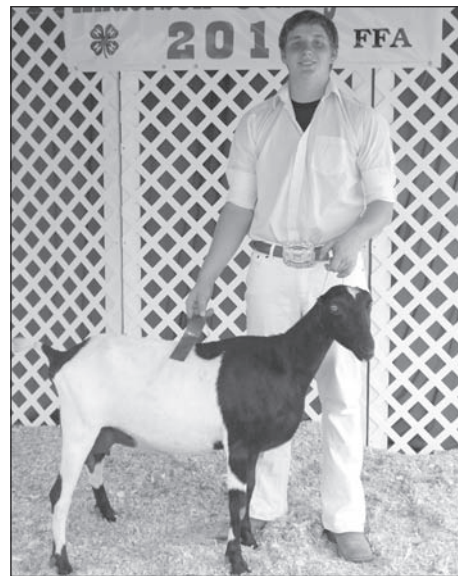
