Goppert Foundation puts 24-hr plan at rec center over goal line

GARNETT — The plan to upgrade the Garnett Recreation Center to a 24-hour operating facility got a final boost recently with a \$7,380 grant from the Goppert Foundation.

nization had agreed to fund the proposal's final conversion costs, and that the revised plan should set the project for introduction in early September.

"We anticipated having the keyless entry system in place at the Recreation Center toward the beginning of next month," Weiner told city commissioners in his advance report for the Aug. 14 city commission meeting. "We are extremely grateful to the Goppert Foundation for their generous grant funding the door and software system."

Goppert, which owns

Goppert State Savings Bank in Garnett, has been a major funder of the recreation center since its inception in 2010, after the Kansas Army National Guard gifted the former armory building to the city in a downsizing move that turned over numerous facilities across the state.

Since that time the facility has subsisted as part of the city's general budget. In 2017 the center had expenses of about \$60,000 with receipts of some \$49,000.

Weiner developed a plan

early on to take the center from its current limited operational hours to a 24-hour facility by adding keyless entry for members and a software system to manage that entry system during hours the facility is not currently staffed. The addition would allow members access to the facility at any time they chose to use it.

The center currently closes mid-morning on weekdays and reopens until around 8 a.m., with more limited hours on Saturday and Sunday.

City rec ball season finishes over 200 games

GARNETT — With the close of the 2018 Garnett Recreation ball season Recreation Director Phil Bures reported some notable statistics to city commissioners.

The information was part of department reports written and submitted for consideration at last week's city commission meeting.

Bures provided a dizzying recount of summer game schedules, and noted the city had a few teams that brought in tournament trophies.

"We started the season

on May 22 and we schedule games Monday through Friday," Bures said. "Our season this year was 36 days or roughly seven weeks, and in that seven weeks we played a total of 216 games," Bures said.

"That is an average of 6 games a night. We only rained out two days this summer, and all those were made up," he said.

Bures said the hectic schedule had also reflected well for concession sales in the ball-park concession stand.

Kobach ekes out win over Colyer

GARNETT — It took a week, but Kansas Republicans' pick for the governor's race culminated last Tuesday when Governor Jeff Colyer conceded the primary election to Secretary of State Kris Kobach.

In perhaps the tightest race ever in a Kansas statewide election, Kobach led Colyer by a mere 345 votes as of Tuesday, after Johnson County provisional votes were counted and boosted Kobach's count by 24 votes. Colyer had carried Johnson County's regular vote by about 6 percentage points.

A "provisional" ballot is a ballot cast at the polls about which there is some question as to the voter's eligibility. In those circumstances, the voter is allowed to vote and his or her ballot confirmed later during the canvass of the votes.

Federal law guarantees every voter who shows up to the polls the right to cast a ballot if the voter declares he or she is entitled to vote.

Colyer said he would not force a recount and would not challenge the election's outcome in court, asking instead for Republicans to unite to hold onto the governor's office.

Anderson County Republican voters were as split as the rest of the state, giving Kobach 393 votes and Colyer 382. Anderson and about a half dozen other counties had not canvassed their votes by Colyer's Tuesday announcement, opting for a canvass date of yesterday, August 20, but any change in those rural counties was not expected to have a major effect on the governor's race.

Anderson County Clerk Julie Heck said about 22.5 percent of eligible county voters took part in the primary — or 1,218 of the county's 5,415 reg-

Garnett cowboy holds on for 2nd in Coffeyville bareback riding event

COFFEYVILLE — An Anderson County man took the lead in the first night of bareback riding action at the Inter-State Rodeo in Coffeyville on Thursday and finished second at its conclusion.

Jesse Pope, who lives near Garnett but attends college at Missouri Valley in Marshall, Mo., scored 80 points to set the bar in his event on Thursday.

Pope said he knew the New Frontier Rodeo Co. horse, Sinner, would be good. The horse "had this little move right out of the chute, then bucked straight down the arena. You couldn't ask for a better one to get on," Pope said. The "little move" was a jump to the right, then to the left, and "if you didn't have a hold of (the horse), it's kind of hard to stay in the middle of him."

Pope, who is nineteen years old, won the bareback riding for the Kansas High School Rodeo Association all four years of high school (2014-2017) and the saddle bronc riding three years. He won the bareback riding at the National High School Finals Rodeo in 2016, and in college rodeo, has done well, win-

ning every single rodeo he's been to. He competed at the College National Finals Rodeo last June, finishing in the top ten in the collegiate ranks.

And he's sitting second in the Prairie Circuit standings as well, pro rodeo's designation of rodeos in Kansas, Oklahoma and Nebraska. He loves to compete: "I eat it up," he said. But the camaraderie in rodeo is just as important to him. "The nice thing about rodeo is I'm friends with everybody I get to rodeo with. We all get to sit back (behind the chutes) and joke around and have a good time. That's probably my favorite thing about it. I can be best friends with who I'm riding against."

In college, Pope's working toward a public relations degree. At last year's Inter-State Rodeo, he tied for fifth place.

In the saddle bronc riding, an Oklahoma man is in the lead.

Preston Kafka, originally from Wagner, S.D. but now living in Freedom, Okla., scored 79 points on the New Frontier Rodeo horse War Jet.

It was a horse he'd been on

before, scoring 80 points on him a few years ago, and the first few seconds of his ride were shaky. "The horse came out (of the chute) backwards, so it was touch and go there for a minute. You never know if they're going to come backwards on top of you, so I waited him out, waiting for him to clear the chutes, before I started my ride. I was thinking about the horse more than my ride, because that's a really nice horse."

Kafka has qualified for the Prairie Circuit Finals Rodeo three times, and is twelfth in the standings; the top twelve qualify for the Circuit Finals, and he needs to do well as the rodeo season winds to an end. "I was needing that ride tonight," he said. "As far as the Prairie Circuit standings are, I'm sitting on the bubble to make the circuit finals. To have that quality of a horse, I was chomping at the bit."

Kafka graduated from Panhandle State University in Goodwell, Okla., with a degree in chemistry and a minor in animal science. He'll use his chemistry degree someday, but for

ANDERSON COUNTY COMMISSION MEETING, AUGUST 13, 2018

ANDERSON COUNTY COMMISSION

Commissioner Les McGhee called the meeting of the Anderson County Commission to order at 9:00 AM on August 13, 2018 at the County Commission Room. Attendance: Jerry Howarter, Absent: David Pracht, Present: Leslie McGhee, Present. The pledge of allegiance was recited. Minutes from the previous meeting were approved as presented.

Road & Bridge

Lester Welsh, Road Supervisor, met with the commission. He informed the commission that he had hired someone for the open motor grader position. He also brought to the commission's attention an article in the Advocate about the County giving the City \$25,000 for road projects. Lester was unaware of this arrangement and the commission requested to speak with Chris Weiner from the City of Garnett.

Car Show

Ray and Charmaine Messick met with the commission. They asked for permission to use the courthouse lawn for their annual car show held on June 19th, 2019. The commission agreed to allow them to use it.

City of Garnett

The City will provide the materials and the County will provide the "in-kind" labor cost of approximately \$12,500. The County provides this "in-kind" service to all cities in the county. Cut taxes, cut expenses: Kobach best choice for Kansas

For many Kansas voters put off by the ever-growing cost and size of government and the post-2016 antics of the country's political left, the fact that Kris Kobach raises the hackles of liberals, socialists and their media hit men to such a degree is alone reason enough to justify voting for him in the upcoming gubernatorial election.

But if you peer through the dust and haze fomented by all the Kobach haters over the past several years, you see plenty more to like about Kris Kobach, his philosophy and his vision for Kansas.

Kobach's media-smear reputation revolves primarily around his work as Secretary of State and his attempts to ensure proper voter identification - in the face of critics who apparently believe every Tom, Dick or Harry should be able to vote in Kansas elections. Kobach's private consulting work as an attorney to build legal barriers to illegal immigration has also galloped the open borders crowd. The frequent and faulty assumption, dispensed by his liberal critics and embraced by a predominantly prejudicial press, however, often leaves off the "illegal" portion of the term and tries to pin Kobach and all conservatives, for that matter, as anti-immigrant instead of anti-criminal.

But little has been noted in public circles of Kobach's plan to reduce the size of government and thus reduce government spending - a precursor to reducing taxes and putting Kansas dollars into the economy instead of into the state's purse.

Kobach's plan revolves around the simple aging of the population and the fact that retiring baby boomers make up not only a record number of private industry jobs, but also a significant portion of government jobs. Their retirement, then, is an opportunity to reduce the size and cost of government through attrition and without mass layoffs. It's the same method Kobach used in the Secretary of State's office - and it worked to the tune of a 30 percent reduction of office spending and an 18 percent reduction in agency staff.

Anyone in business knows labor is one of the most expensive line items in a budget, and it's a major portion of the massive expansion of government over past decades. While the growth of the federal workforce has slowed since 1960

to around 2.5- 3 million workers, state and local governments have ballooned, tripling to over 18 million employees.

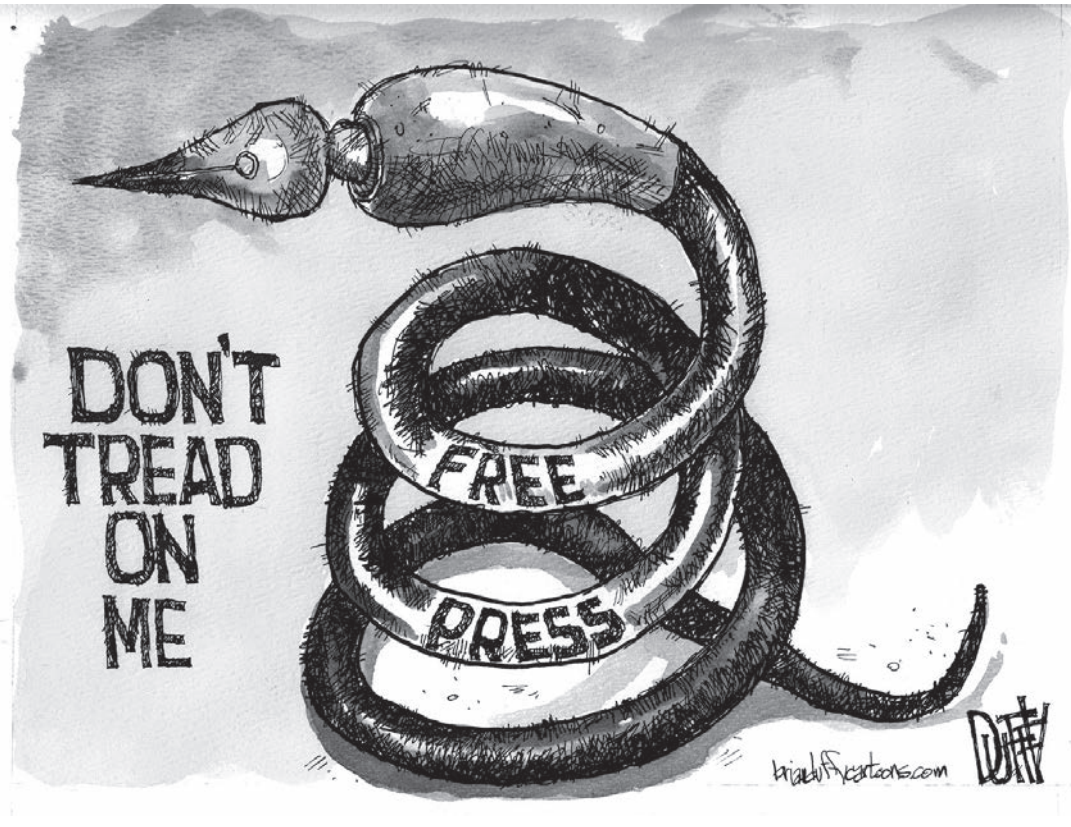
Every private business in the world now performs the same or more duties with less staff than it did 10 or 20 years ago. New efficiencies and technologies avail themselves, and smart operators take advantage of them and make them work.

This is a conservative philosophy toward fiscal responsibility, and Kobach is the only candidate in the race to have properly detailed one. The idea of commensurate spending reductions to match tax cuts - an area the Kansas Legislature failed to address in the Brownback Administration's economic plan - being the key to any tax cut plan.

The Democrat's nominee, Laura Kelly, embodies old school, tax-and-spend Democrat approaches - promising yet more tax money instead of more accountability for Kansas public education; seeking a financially disastrous expansion of Medicaid benefits in Kansas and pledging "support" for workers and training programs and rural enterprises. Outside of higher taxes and bigger government, there is woefully little meat on the bones of Kelly's economic proposals for the state.

With the nation now reaping the benefits of a conservative approach to economic growth, this is no time for Kansas to step back toward the high costs and inefficiencies of big government bloat. Kris Kobach has a great plan and should be Kansas' next governor.

Kobach, Kelly must choose routes after primary

to snag votes from both. This year things are going to be different. Don't expect Kobach to move toward the political middle in his campaign. Now, short-term Gov. Jeff Colyer might have, but he conceded, remember.

So, we come to a campaign where the narrow conservative side of the GOP—which includes Kobach, of course, and unsuccessful gubernatorial nomination candidate Insurance Commissioner Ken Selzer—isn't looking for any move to the center. Nope, and had Kobach lost the GOP nomination, we're betting he wouldn't have let Colyer move to the center, either.

So...where does this gubernatorial race go? Who gets elected governor and has the authority to take that preposterous stuffed buffalo head off the wall of the governor's office and, of course, run the rest of the state?

Does Kobach come up with something new that will appeal to moderate Republicans, most of whom voted for someone else in the primary? Does Kelly come up with something that will see the moderate Republicans, who are probably most of the GOP voters, furrow their brows and vote for her as long as nobody's watching?

Surprising that this election might come down to the conservative Republicans of the state and the Democrats, with Orman as a possible off-ramp for those who at least talk about the general conservative values and have never read the Kansas Republican Party platform.

Oh, and whoever wins the governor's office must remember that in just two short years, whatever the governor pushes for or against splashes back on members of both parties in the Kansas House and Senate.

The Turkish hostage crisis doesn't help its problems

It's never a good idea to negotiate with a hostage-taker, but when it's a NATO ally, there isn't much choice.

The Trump administration has been trying to get back a Christian pastor detained in Turkey since October 2016, and when a possible deal at the sidelines of the NATO summit fell through, decided to drop the hammer.

The administration sanctioned Turkey's justice and interior ministers - remember, these are top officials of a fellow NATO country. The action hit the Turkish currency and stock market hard. Then President Donald Trump intervened in his inimitable style, with a tweet promising a doubling of aluminum and steel tariffs against the country and pointedly noting the drop in the value of the lira.

As always, the president's shoot-from-the-lip style is open to question, but Turkey deserved every last character - including the two exclamation points - in that presidential tweet. Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan is not Justin Trudeau or Angela Merkel, a leader firmly within the liberal West who annoys Trump. He's an Islamist authoritarian who is fundamentally changing the character of an erstwhile ally.

Erdogan's resort to hostage-taking as a tactic to gain leverage over allies - it's not just us - is a barbarous throwback and a disgusting homage to rogue states like Iran and

North Korea. He also has grabbed a Turkish-American NASA scientist and local employees of American consulates.

The case against the pastor, the highest-profile case, is ludicrous. Andrew Brunson lived with his family in a seaside city, Izmir, for more than 20 years until the government, after Erdogan survived a coup, decided that he was guilty of aiding terrorist organizations and military espionage.

The alleged supporting evidence is a collection of absurdities - a video of a traditional Arab dish sent to Brunson by his daughter, a church member texting the pastor about missing a service, a photo of him with a man in a scarf bearing certain colors, and so on.

What this clearly is about is holding Brunson to try to get Fethullah Gulen, a former Erdogan ally and cleric who lives on a farm in Pennsylvania. With great fervency but little evidence, the Turkish government accuses Gulen of being behind the shadowy July 15, 2016, coup that became an occasion for Erdogan to seize emergency powers and purge the state and civil society of his political enemies. This isn't a trade the U.S. should be willing to make.

Erdogan blames an "economic war" for his country's dire economic straits. He should instead blame his own mismanagement. Turkey was already vulnerable to an end of the era of cheap capital, even before it pursued a course of confrontation with a country vastly richer and more powerful than it is.

There were always going to be stresses in the U.S.-Turkish alliance; Turkey views the Kurds as a threat, and we consider them allies. But the chief cause of the radical deterioration in the relationship is Turkey's rank anti-Americanism, a paranoia stoked at every turn by Erdogan for his own cynical purposes. He is now reaping what he sowed, and if Erdogan wants relief, his first step should be releasing the hostages.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Old glass lid with unknown use found

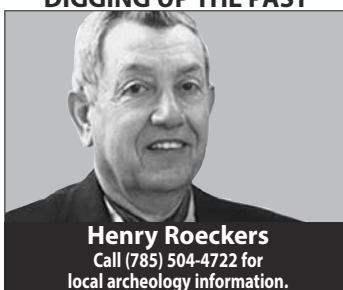
As I've stated numerous times in my columns, one never knows what they may find or dig up around an old homesite.

Wheat code finally cracked; wheat genome sequence will bring stronger wheat varieties to nation's farmers

MANHATTAN — Kansas State University scientists, in collaboration with the International Wheat Genome Sequencing Consortium, published today in the international journal *Science* a detailed description of the complete genome of bread wheat, the world's most widely cultivated crop.

This work will pave the way for the production of wheat varieties better adapted to climate challenges, with higher yields, enhanced nutritional quality and improved sustainability. The article is titled "Shifting the limits in wheat research and breeding using a fully annotated reference genome."

The research article — authored by more than 200 scientists from 73 research institutions in 20 countries — presents the reference genome of the bread wheat variety Chinese Spring. The DNA sequence ordered along the 21 wheat chromosomes is the highest-quality genome sequence produced to date for wheat. It is the result of 13 years of collaborative international research and the support of the National Science Foundation, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Institute of Food and Agriculture, Kansas farmers and many others.

"It is a dream come true for Kansas wheat farmers, who

were the first to invest in the wheat genome sequencing project and were pivotal in rallying U.S. wheat farmers in support of the wheat genome sequencing project," said Bikram Gill, distinguished professor emeritus of plant pathology at Kansas State University who organized the first National Science Foundation and U.S. Department of Agriculture-sponsored workshop planning meeting on wheat genome sequencing in Washington, D.C., in 2003.

A key crop for food security, wheat is the staple food of more than a third of the global human population and accounts for almost 20 percent of the total calories and protein consumed by humans worldwide, more than any other single food source. It also serves as an important source of vitamins and minerals.

Kansas farmers grow an average of 340 million bushels of wheat each year, but acres planted to wheat have dropped dramatically over the past decade, from 10 million acres to fewer than 8 million. To meet future demands of a projected world population of 9.6 billion by 2050, wheat productivity needs to increase by 1.6 percent each year. To preserve biodiversity, water and nutrient resources, the majority of this increase has to be achieved via crop and trait improvement

on land currently cultivated, rather than committing new land to cultivation. In order for farmers to dedicate these precious resources to wheat production rather than production of other crops, wheat farming must become profitable.

With the reference genome sequence now completed, breeders have at their fingertips new tools to address global challenges. They will be able to more rapidly identify genes and regulatory elements underlying complex agronomic traits such as yield, grain quality, resistance to fungal diseases and tolerance to physical stress — and produce harder wheat varieties.

"Completion of the sequence is a landmark event that will serve as a critical foundation for future wheat improvement," said Allan Fritz, Kansas State University professor of agronomy and wheat breeder. "It is the key to allowing efficient, real-time integration of relevant genetics, making the selection process more efficient — it's a turbocharger for wheat breeding."

It is expected that the availability of a high-quality reference genome sequence will boost wheat improvement over the next decades, with benefits similar to those observed with maize and rice after their reference sequences were produced. "Kansas wheat farmers

have been supporting the wheat genome sequencing efforts through the Kansas Wheat Commission's wheat assessment since the establishment of the International Wheat Genome Sequencing Consortium in 2005, with a cumulative amount of nearly a quarter of a million dollars," said Justin Gilpin, chief executive officer for Kansas Wheat. "The sequence of the bread wheat genome has already had a positive effect on wheat improvement, which not only affects the science behind wheat breeding, but has a long-lasting positive outcome in regard to wheat producer productivity, profitability and, ultimately, livelihoods."

Sequencing the bread wheat genome was long considered an impossible task because of its enormous size — five times larger than the human genome — and complexity — bread wheat has three sub-genomes and more than 85 percent of the genome is composed of repeated elements.

"It is exciting to be a part of this landmark achievement," said Jesse Poland, associate professor at Kansas State University and director of the Wheat Genetics Resource Center and the U.S. Agency for International Development Innovation Lab for Applied Wheat Genomics. "This international effort, toward some-

thing that was once deemed impossible, will have tremendous impact on wheat in Kansas, and the world."

The impact of the wheat reference sequence has already been significant in the scientific community, as exemplified by the publication on the same date of six additional publications describing and using the reference sequence resource, one appearing in the same issue of *Science*, one in *Science Advances* and four in *Genome Biology*. In addition, more than 100 publications crediting the reference sequence have been published since the resource was made available to the scientific community in January 2017.

"We are extensively using the new reference sequence for more informed molecular breeding," Poland said. "It is really having a big impact."

In addition to the sequence of the 21 chromosomes, the *Science* article also presents the precise location of 107,891 genes and of more than 4 million molecular markers, as well as sequence information between the genes and markers containing the regulatory elements influencing the expression of genes.

The International Wheat Genome Sequencing

Consortium achieved this result by combining the resources it generated over the last 13 years using classic physical mapping methods and the most recent DNA sequencing technologies; the sequence data were assembled and ordered along the 21 chromosomes using highly efficient algorithms, and genes were identified with dedicated software programs.

All consortium reference sequence resources are publicly available at its data repository at URGI-INRA Versailles and at other international scientific databases such as GrainGenes and Ensembl Plants.

The International Wheat Genome Sequencing Consortium, with 2,400 members in 68 countries, is an international, collaborative consortium, established in 2005 by a group of wheat growers, plant scientists, and public and private breeders. The goal of the consortium is to make a high-quality genome sequence of bread wheat publicly available, in order to lay a foundation for basic research that will enable breeders to develop improved varieties.

The November 2nd deadline is now only about a month away. Sign up today to become a knowledgeable gardening

enthusiast. If you don't have the internet stop by one of the district's extension offices in Lyndon, Ottawa or Garnett and pick up a hard copy of the application. As winter approaches here are four ways to prep your home

Boil Water Advisory issued for Anderson County RWD No. 4

TOPEKA – The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) has issued a boil water advisory for the 12 purchasing systems of Public Wholesale Water Supply District No. 12.

They include Anderson Co. RWD No. 4, City of Lebo, City of Quenemo, Coffey Co. RWD No. 3, City of Lyndon, City of Waverly, Osage Co. RWD No. 4, City of Melvern, City of Williamsburg, Osage

Co. RWD No. 6, City of Pomona and Melvern Res Arrow Rock.

Customers should observe the following precautions until further notice:

- Boil water for one minute prior to drinking or food preparation or use bottled water.
- Dispose of ice cubes and do not use ice from a household automatic icemaker.
- Disinfect dishes and other food contact surfaces by immersion for at least one min-

ute in clean tap water that contains one teaspoon of unscented household bleach per gallon of water.

• Water used for bathing does not generally need to be boiled. Supervision of children is necessary while bathing so that water is not ingested. Persons with cuts or severe rashes may wish to consult their physicians.

• If your tap water appears dirty, flush the water lines by

letting the water run until it clears.

The advisory took effect on August 20, 2018 and will remain in effect until the conditions that placed the system at risk of bacterial contamination are resolved. KDHE officials issued the advisory because of a line break resulting in a loss of pressure in the system. Failure to maintain adequate pressure may result in a loss of chlorine residuals and bacterial contam-

ination.

Regardless of whether the public water supplier or KDHE announced a boil water advisory, only KDHE can issue the rescind order following testing at a certified laboratory.

Strategic plan outlines efforts to address opioid crisis in Kansas

In 2016, there were more than 300 drug-poisoning deaths in Kansas, and approximately half of those involved a prescription or an illicit opioid. Although Kansas is below the national average for fatal opioid overdoses, the opioid crisis is an emerging threat that remains a priority for the state to address. The Kansas Prescription Drug and Opioid Advisory Committee has developed a four-year plan to

provide help to those affected and empower professionals with the strategies they need to reduce prescription drug and opioid misuse, abuse and associated adverse health outcomes.

"Kansas has an opportunity to address the opioid crisis proactively through federal programs and collaborative strategic planning with stakeholders. We convened the Kansas Prescription Drug and

Opioid Advisory Committee to carry out this critical project," said Dr. Greg Lakin, Medical Director at the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE).

The role of the Kansas Prescription Drug and Opioid Advisory Committee is to develop and implement a coordinated, multi-disciplinary state-wide strategic plan to provide a comprehensive approach to the opioid crisis in Kansas. The Kansas Prescription Drug and Opioid Advisory Committee is facilitated by DCCCA, Inc., with joint support from KDHE and the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services (KDADS). This blue-ribbon panel is comprised of more than 80 professionals from 42 organizations across the state. These partnerships include representatives from community organizations, professional associations, State agencies, educational organizations and health systems.

Today, the Kansas Prescription Drug and Opioid

Advisory Committee published the Kansas Prescription Drug and Opioid Misuse and Overdose Strategic Plan 2018-2022, with the overarching goal of identifying and implementing prevention and intervention efforts around prescription drug and illicit opioid abuse, thereby decreasing fatal and non-fatal overdose rates in Kansas.

"Publishing the Kansas Prescription Drug and Opioid Misuse and Overdose Strategic Plan is an important step in developing a sustainable, systematic approach to addressing the opioid crisis in Kansas," said KDADS Secretary Tim Keck. "The strategic plan will guide stakeholders at both the state and local level with the implementation of prevention and response strategies for prescription drug and opioid misuse and overdose."

This strategic plan was developed around five priority areas: Prevention, Provider Education, Treatment and Recovery, Law Enforcement,

and Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS). The goals, objectives, and strategies in the plan are driven by Kansas-specific data, support best practices, and aim to address multiple levels of impact. The document may be downloaded in full or in part from the website, which also includes information regarding the Kansas Prescription Drug and Opioid Advisory Committee as well as Kansas-specific epidemiological data. This project is supported by the Centers for Disease Control

and Prevention's (CDC) Prescription Drug Overdose: Data-Driven Prevention Initiative and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) Partnerships for Success program.

Dr. Lakin serves on the Kansas Prescription Drug and Opioid Advisory Committee. He also serves as Chair on the Governor's Substance Use Disorder Task Force, which is in the process of developing recommendations to the Governor to further address this issue. The Kansas Prescription Drug and Opioid Misuse and Overdose Strategic Plan 2018-2022 will serve as a resource for the task force as the members compile their recommendations, due to the Governor by Sept. 1.

Music makes for better sales

The chicken fried steak I had that day at the cafe was out of this world, but without any music playing in the background, I could hear too many things I didn't want to hear.

For starters I could hear every conversation going on in the kitchen. I could hear a bearing going out of the fan in the air conditioning unit; I could hear every clink of silverware against other customers' plates. The traffic outside passing the window sounded like it was right by my table.

I didn't stay for dessert, and that cost the joint an add-on sale of \$3.49.

I've noticed since then in similar music-less situations how desperately most venues need background music, and that fact is borne out in research that shows the *right* kind of music enhances customers' moods and drives more sales.

It's true for two big reasons: 1) people are more likely to enjoy a shopping experience if they're in a good mood, and music is one of the exterior elements that gets them there; 2) the lack of music allows us to be invaded by the rest of the abrasive and invasive world sounds of every-day life - mechanization, traffic, a crying baby - and most of them just aren't all that pleasant.

The fact is, there are a lot of things that can affect customer behavior. Things like past experience always come in to play along with retail displays, color use, store layout, not to mention personal issues among customers like money and other mood determiners. But research has proven if you match background music not just to your customers but also your brand, you can get people to linger longer - about 18 percent longer on average - and boost their spending by as much as 17 percent or more.

HOW TO SELL STUFF

Business Insider's website reviews a handful of research examples that confirm the impact. Grocery stores, which do more retail than anybody, pioneered customer mood research and found that louder music made customers move through a store more quickly but didn't appear to reduce purchases. Softer, lower tempo music increased their length of stay and increased the purchases they made. "High brow" classical music may make people buy more at a restaurant or wine shop, but it also paints the picture in customers' minds that things in this store are more expensive, and that may affect their shopping pattern development and chances/frequency of returning there to shop.

What kind of music should you play? Consider your customer profile and the fact that your small business more than likely seeks customers from a range of ages and backgrounds. The melba toast approach is probably best, and if your customer profile changes on certain days of the week or during the day, be ready to match it with appropriate music.

Music soothes the savage beast, and it can also help you sell stuff.

College-bound students – Protect your property and set a car care plan

The transition from high school graduate to new college student is an exciting milestone, and moving away from home is part of the process for many. AAA Kansas reminds college students and their parents of important steps – which every few think of – before heading off to school: review your insurance policy and make a plan for car maintenance.

A Consumer Reports article says that dorm rooms can be a hot spot for thieves. Two roommates could have as much as \$6,000 worth of electronics alone – laptops, tablets, smartphones and gaming systems – as well as other items of value in their small living space.

According to U.S. Department of Education data of crimes reported on college campuses, theft of personal property is the most common crime, followed by motor vehicle theft.

“College students living away from home should know they may have limited coverage under their parents’ insurance policies,” said Alex Greig, Regional Insurance Manager for AAA Kansas. “Before leaving for college, students should check to see what risks and liabilities are covered.”

Homeowners and renters insurance tips for students:

- If you live in a dorm, some personal possessions may be covered under your parents’ homeowners or renters insurance policies. Expensive items such as computers and other electronics may be subject to coverage limits under a standard homeowners policy, and some states require a special student endorsement.

- If you live off-campus, purchase renters insurance. Renters insurance is necessary to protect you and your belongings, and can protect you from liability in the event that someone is accidentally injured on the property.

- Leave valuables at home. While some valuable items, such as laptops, may be needed on campus, items such as expensive jewelry may be best left at home.

- Create a “dorm inventory.” Create a detailed inventory of all items you’ll be taking with you, including photos and receipts. In the event that you need to file a claim, an up-to-date inventory will help make the process easier.

- Safeguard your items from theft. Always lock your dorm room door and never leave belongings unattended on campus. According to the Insurance Information Institute, the library, dining hall and other public places are the primary areas where property theft occurs on campus.

Auto insurance tips for students

- Coverage may depend on whether you leave home or stay in the area. If you bring a car to campus and remain on your parents’ policy, coverage likely still applies. If you attend an out-of-state school, make sure your insurance coverage follows you. It gets a little tricky if the student takes classes year round and does not plan to return home during the summers. Technically, they have relocated to their college location. It gets a little more complex if they have on campus or off campus housing.

- Check with your insurance agent. To see what discounts you may qualify for and to ensure you have adequate coverage while away at school, contact your insurance agent. If you have questions about any or are concerned about gaps in your existing coverage, contact a local insurance agent at 866-AAA-4YOU, or aaa.com/insurance.

Lessons on Car Maintenance for College Students

In addition to reviewing insurance coverage, students heading to college should also address the important subject of vehicle maintenance and repair.

“Frequently, a teenager’s vehicle is maintained by parents while living at home, and lessons on proper car care are only briefly discussed and seldom used,” said Shawn Steward, AAA Kansas spokesman. “Before hitting the road, it is vital that your college student fully understands how to independently take care of their vehicle.”

Before sending a son or daughter off to college with a car, AAA Kansas encourages

parents to sit down with the child and discuss a plan for proper vehicle maintenance, as well as how to deal with unexpected problems when parental rescue is more than just a few minutes away.

Check and Maintain Tires

Tires are one of the easiest components of a vehicle to maintain, but they are frequently overlooked until something goes wrong. Every student should have a tire pressure gauge in their vehicle, know where it is located, and understand how to use it properly. While there are a variety of tire pressure gauges, those with electronic readouts might be the easiest for the teen to use. Explain that tires should be checked at least once a month when the tires are cold.

Show your young adult where to find the vehicle manufacturer’s recommended tire pressure – typically on a label located on the driver’s door jamb or in the glove box. It is important to let them know they should not use the inflation pressure found on the tire sidewall. That is the tire’s maximum pressure level, but it might not be the correct pressure for the tire when used on their particular vehicle.

To demonstrate proper tire care, AAA offers a number of short videos that can be viewed on the AAA YouTube channel.

Know the Vehicle’s Maintenance Schedule

Performing the manufacturer’s regularly scheduled maintenance on a vehicle will greatly extend its life and help ward off more costly repairs down the road. While it’s a good idea to make sure your student’s car is current with all maintenance items prior to sending them off to college, it’s possible some items will be due while they are away.

Sit down and go over the owner’s manual with your son or daughter. Explain the recommended maintenance schedule and remind them that in addition to basic oil changes other important items such as filters, batteries and brakes must also be regularly checked and maintained. AAA recommends that parents and teens create a shared calendar with reminders so both are aware of any upcoming required main-

tenance or services.

The school year spans the winter months when inclement weather can place added demands on vehicle electrical systems. The average lifespan of a car battery is three to five years, so AAA recommends that any battery in this age range be checked before the student leaves for school. In many areas, the AAA Mobile Battery Service will come to a member’s home and provide this service at no charge.

Find a Repair Facility Near College

It is important for parents to help teens identify an auto repair shop they can trust near their school in case routine servicing or unexpected repairs become necessary.

If unfamiliar with the area around a college, visit AAA.com/Repair to locate nearby AAA Approved Auto Repair facilities. As a free public service for all motorists, AAA inspects auto repair shops around the country and only approves those that meet and continually maintain high professional standards for equipment, customer service, cleanliness and training.

When first arriving at the college, AAA recommends parents and students visit the selected repair shop and meet the staff. Ask for some shop business cards that you and your teen can keep handy in case an emergency arises.

Prepare for Roadside Emergencies

It is also important for parents to prepare their children for a breakdown or other roadside emergency – especially if they are attending college too far away to ‘call home’ for help.

Make sure the teen’s vehicle has a well-stocked roadside emergency kit with contents suitable for local weather conditions during the school year. A basic kit should include a flashlight with extra batteries, jumper cables, first-aid kit, bottled water, rags or paper towels, a tire pressure gauge, a blanket, granola or energy bars, and a selection of basic hand tools. In areas with winter ice and snow, add an ice scraper, snow brush and kitty litter or other material to increase traction if stuck in snow.

New technology will define the future of farming

(BPT) - When you think of automated vehicles, you probably think of driverless cars. While that particular movement is certainly in the news, it's not the only place where driverless technology is gaining momentum. Did you know that driverless technology innovations are occurring every day in agriculture as well? While most of us won't see this technology since it's confined to the farm, driverless tractors are poised to change the way our food is grown.

The race to autonomy

Today's driverless tractors still need an operator to keep the tractor on task. But for 20 years, farm equipment manufacturers have been working on building a precision platform with GPS navigation to provide tractors with pure self-driving automation. The ultimate goal is to offer farmers driverless equipment that is smart - or autonomous - so it can perform tasks completely independent of human intervention.

The farm equipment industry has spent a couple of decades moving toward developing autonomous equipment, and the race to commercially market that equipment has recently moved into high gear.

In 2016, both New Holland and Case IH introduced autonomous tractor prototypes, which the companies are still testing in the field. At the same time, John Deere signaled its commitment to autonomous machinery when it acquired Blue River Technology - a company that specializes in computer vision and machine learning, key technologies for developing smart farm equipment.

The digital component

In addition to performing the desired tasks, smart farm equipment also has the ability to capture vital data about the operation and how the land is being used. This data will be invaluable to farmers, according to Dan Burdett, global head of digital agriculture at

Syngenta.

"The driverless tractor and automated farm equipment will be able to record any field event, which is important for developing insights, such as calculating return on investment," he says. "Capturing timely and accurate data to document field applications for reports and stewardship requirements will also be possible."

Because various sensors, tools and artificial intelligence will automate data collection, Burdett says the data will "enable a whole new level of decision-making capabilities. Growers will benefit from all of it," he says, adding that the adoption of digital technologies in the ag industry is inevitable and moving fast.

"It's escalating, and that's driven partly by farm economics," says Burdett. "It's very important for farmers to know their numbers. Digital tools and information technology can help farmers be better business people."

The future of autonomy

For many years, the components needed to bring autonomous vehicles to market were cost-prohibitive for ag manufacturers. But that is changing. The importance of dialogue between farmers and consumers

More often than we'd like to admit we sometimes shoot ourselves in the foot when talking about the challenges we face in farming and ranching. These conversations with our friends, neighbors and family members take place at the local café, filling station, after church or Friday evening ball games.

During these visits, farmers and ranchers sometimes conclude that consumers and non-aggies don't like them. Or, their urban acquaintances don't listen to them or care one iota about raising crops or caring for livestock. Most people don't need to know much about farming today. They probably think about agriculture less than 30 seconds a year and 20 seconds of that time is based on misinformation.

Why should they?

Do farmers and ranchers wonder what a Detroit automaker does? Who he or she is? And what about their family? While non-farm and ranch people harbor misconceptions about agriculture, believe me, they like farmers and ranchers. They admire this profession, especially if they understand farmers and ranchers provide the food their families eat.

Still, no one wants to be edu-

cated or preached to. Humans like to engage in conversations. They like give and take.

Usually, if a person is knowledgeable about a profession like raising cattle, another person who doesn't know about the livestock industry may be curious and willing to listen.

And while no one understands agriculture like farmers and ranchers, encourage and foster dialogues with those who know little about this profession. This includes people outside your comfort zone - someone you don't usually talk to like city cousins, foodies, medics, lawyers, etc.

Conduct such conversations on a flight to another state or country. Develop dialogue with people at a professional meeting, just about anywhere and with anyone who isn't savvy about agriculture.

Times continue to change. Forty years ago, people

expressed little interest in agriculture.

As a fledgling photo journalist in the mid-1970s, I can't remember someone asking me about agriculture at a social event. This just didn't happen even though some knew I worked in ag journalism.

Agriculture wasn't hip, cool or fly back then. Today the tables have turned, and some people are quite interested in where their food comes from. They don't hesitate to walk up to you, cocktail in hand and ask, "Tell me about antibiotics and beef production."

Talk to them. Tell your story. Exude passion about your chosen profession.

But remember - ask them about their profession, who they are and what makes them tick. Listen.

Develop those relationships and build on those dialogues. Before you can expect someone to listen to you for one-half hour about how important international trade is to your bottom line, you must listen to them tell you about their home and garden, their chosen path in life or whatever else they choose to talk about at the time.

There is a voice that doesn't use words - listen.

Insurance, securities alignment saves money, increases efficiency of state agencies

The Kansas Insurance Department (KID) and the Office of the Kansas Securities Commissioner (KSC) aligned as one state agency on July 1, 2017. In the 13 months since then, we have achieved many of the savings and service goals that we anticipated when we introduced legislation to make the transition possible.

As you might recall, the securities agency became a division of the insurance department when the legislation became effective. The law gave the insurance commissioner the authority to appoint the securities commissioner for a four-year term. Also, the securities commissioner can only be removed for official misconduct.

When we touted the alignment, we told the Kansas Legislature that we could show significant financial savings and service improvements because of it. Let me list some of those results that have occurred since last year.

- Total full-time equivalency (FTE) positions for KSC were reduced from 30 to 26 in fiscal year (FY) 2018 and reduced to 25 in FY 2019, in the updated budget estimates for the KSC division. Most of this reduction came from closing the KSC office in Prairie Village, KS, and by not filling a position being vacated by a retirement in April 2018.

- Total FTE positions for KID (other than KSC positions) have been reduced from 109 to 105.3 in both FY 2018 and FY 2019, in the updated budget

estimates for KID.

- Payroll savings in the KSC portion of the KID budget, as compared to the original recommended pre-consolidation budgets, are \$462,630 in FY 2018 and \$498,141 in FY 2019. The actual savings in KSC payroll expenditures during FY 2018, as compared to the pre-consolidation governor's budget, totals \$726,809.

- Estimated payroll savings for KID divisions other than KSC, as compared to the original recommended pre-consolidation budgets, are \$246,815 in FY 2018 and \$158,063 in FY 2019. These savings result from attrition, discontinuing the Deputy Insurance Commissioner position and a partial cross-appointment for one Director to supervise both the KID Anti-Fraud Division and the KSC Enforcement section.

- Other savings resulting from closure of the Prairie Village office based on pre-consolidated budget estimates for KSC are \$47,444 in FY 2018 and \$47,771 in FY 2019.

- Human Resources management is coordinated among KID and KSC staff members.

- Viatical providers are regulated by KID, and viatical investments as securities are subject to KSC regulation. Filings are jointly reviewed by KID and KSC. A viatical settlement allows a life insurance policyholder to sell his/her policies to a third party for an immediate cash benefit. The purchaser of the policy assumes responsibility for paying the remaining premiums and becomes the beneficiary of the life insurance policy.

- KID Public Outreach and KSC Investor Education services are coordinated with KSC staff currently co-located at the KID office building. A KSC administrative position was transferred to KID and is partially cross-appointed to

assist with Investor Education and the KansasMoney.gov website.

Plans continue for consolidation of KSC staff and offices into the KID office building. Significant one-time costs of the move could be paid from rent savings, and then going forward, the annual building rent and parking savings will be approximately \$142,000 per year, based on current amounts being paid by KSC.

As you can see, we have made significant strides toward achieving efficient, consumer-friendly state governmental services. We will continue to find additional outcomes that will better assist Kansans with their insurance and investment needs.

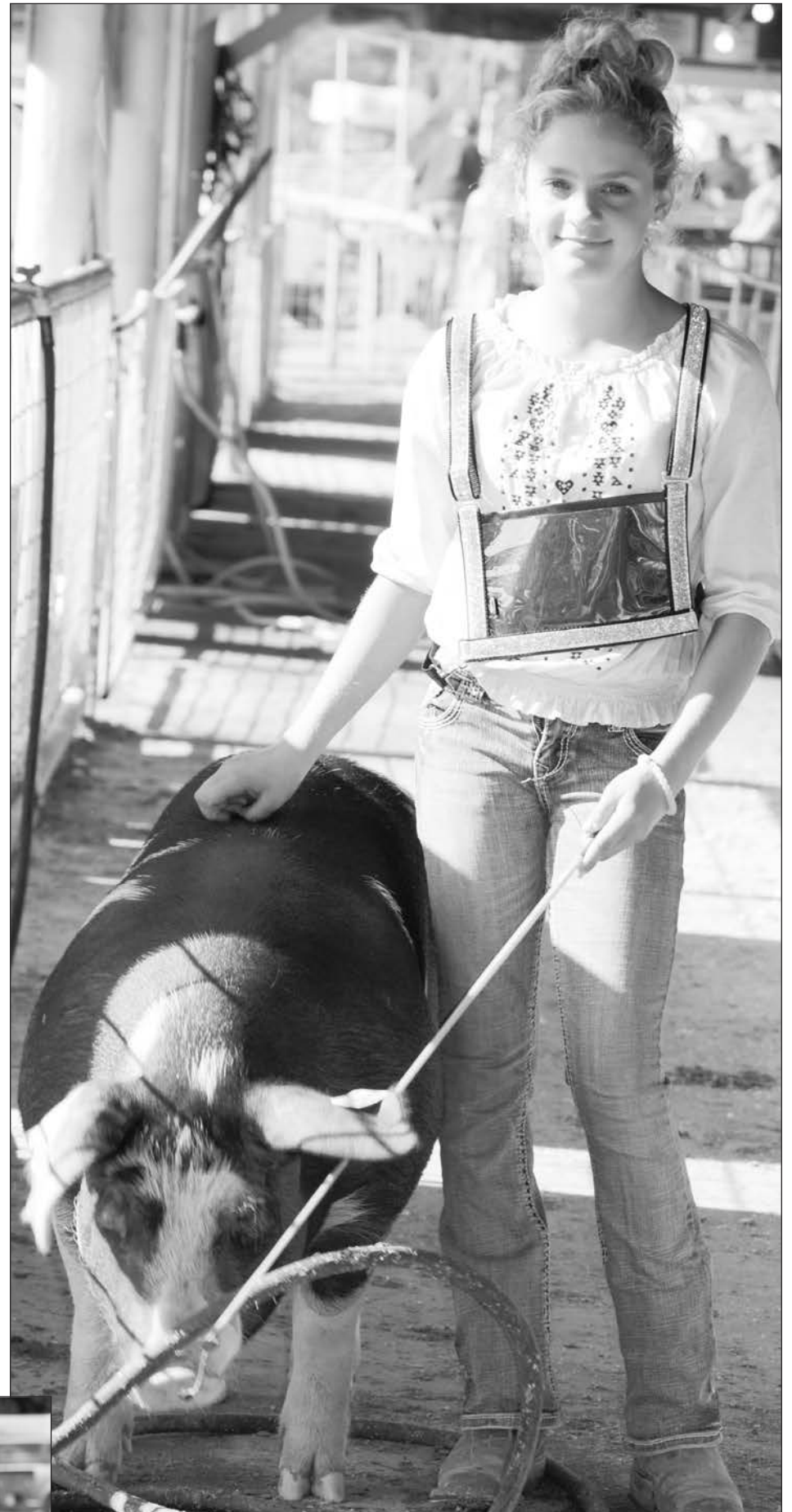

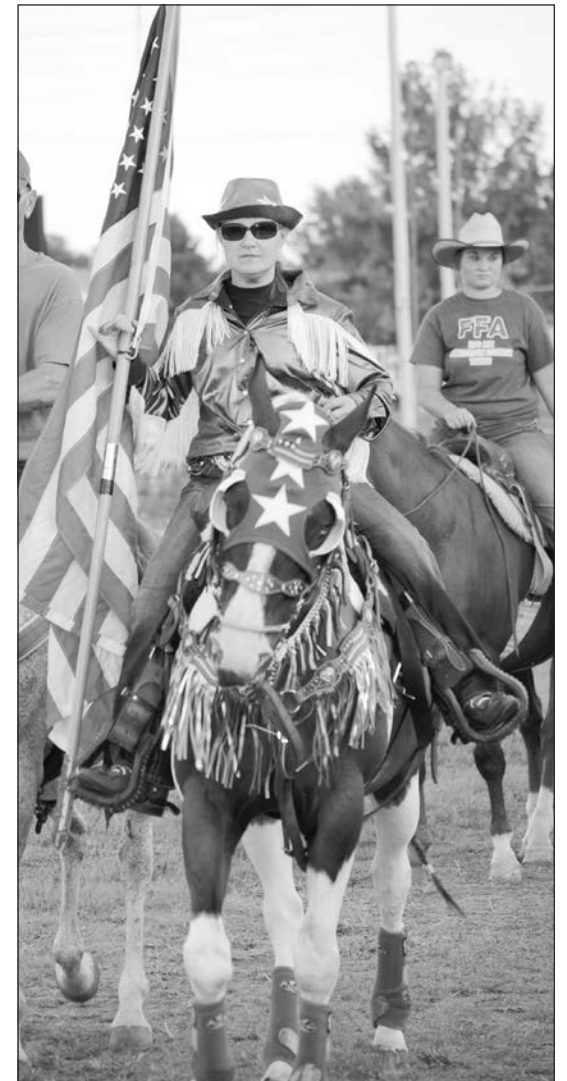
