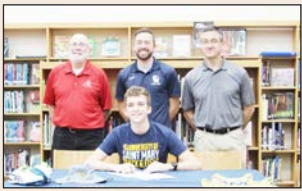

Opioid crooks turning to burglary to fill demand

AuBurn Pharmacy latest in rash of druggists burgled to fill demand for pain drugs

GARNETT - Tighter regulations restricting the dispensing of opiate pain medications may have reduced the flow of the powerful meds into the addicted population, but a recent spate of pharmacy burglaries in the region suggests those restriction have made crime the next best method of acquiring them.

Garnett police said burglars got away with prescription medications in the early morning hours of Thursday last week when they burglarized AuBurn Pharmacy on Maple Street in Garnett. A report from Eureka, Ks., media on Thursday confirmed that Eureka Pharmacy had been burglarized overnight Wednesday as well, with opioid meds the target again.

The two incidents were the latest in a rash of pharmacy burglaries in Kansas and across the U.S., all with opioid meds as their objectives.

Another of AuBurn's 28 stores, this one is Carbondale, was hit about a month ago, with more recent burglaries at pharmacies at Humboldt, Parsons, Burlington and Erie.

Small town law officers nationwide have seen a spike in pharmacy burglaries over the past three years or so, focused in areas where local druggists carry the popular pain meds but where law enforcement may be understaffed. Mike Burns, president and CEO of AuBurn Pharmacies, said the increase in pharmacy burglaries has coincided with tightening restrictions regarding the dispensing of the drugs in the face of a national crisis of opioid addiction.

"It's gotten tougher to get them through other channels," Burns said. "There are fewer doctors writing fake prescriptions, there's a lot more regulation on us and on our wholesalers which has tightened that supply."

Burns said closer monitoring of opioids in Kansas includes a central database that tracks sales of all schedule II, III and IV controlled substance prescriptions, called K-TRACS, instituted by the Kansas Board of Pharmacy and required for all Kansas druggists.

The system is designed to track prescriptions filled for the drugs and look for inconsistencies, such as multiple attempts by the same person to fill prescriptions at various pharmacies. The KBP website stipulates however that a Kansas resident who picks up a prescription in another state is not tracked by K-TRACS.

Burns said those efforts significantly reduced the drugs' availability for black market sales, restricting supply for addicts who will pay \$50-\$80 per pill for some opioid meds. With tighter supply and higher prices mean suppliers are willing to take more risk to get product.

"Since that's all been brought online, they (burglaries) just took a steep rise," Burns said. He said as a result, his operation was reviewing both internal and external security upgrades at each of the company's locations.

The Burlington Police Department used a K-9 unit to investigate the Medicine Shoppe burglary, but the dogs lost the suspect's scent. Officers said their suspect was a white male

ACSO busts swimmer after chase

Suspect tries cold swim to evade cops in pursuit, heads to court today

GREELEY - The Lenexa man who tried to swim the frigid waters of the Marais des Cygnes River in Osawatomie last week to elude pursuing officers will appear in Anderson County District Court today with his legal counsel, as the court reviews his charges associated with a Dec. 8 high speed car chase.

Anderson County Sheriff Vern Valentine said Samuel T. Carter, 30 of Lenexa, was sought on Missouri and Kansas warrants when his northbound 1998 Honda Civic made an unsafe pass and nearly collided with Anderson County Sheriff's Deputy Bert McFaul, who was on patrol and southbound on U.S. 169 south of Greeley about 3:30 p.m.



Carter

McFaul attempted to pull Carter over, but Carter sped away north with McFaul in pursuit at speeds topping 100 mph for some 18 miles. Additional ACSO units assisted as well as Miami County officers when the chase crossed into that county.

Valentine said Carter's car caught fire near 347th Street near Osawatomie, at which time Carter abandoned the vehicle and fled on foot.

Whose number is THAT?

Locals, officials share tips on avoiding new plague of spam calls

GARNETT - Those aggravating "spoof" cell phone calls being received by local residents and cell users all over the globe have become the latest tech tool in phone scammers arsenal, but industry officials have tips for avoiding them and minimizing them.

And, the Review's readers commenting on the paper's Facebook

page have come up with some tricks of their own.

The Better Business Bureau says "Neighbor spoofing" is the latest trick that presents a caller ID number on your cell phone that looks local or from nearby - or maybe even from someone you know. Computer programs that crank out billions of random phone numbers around the clock are able to zone in on area codes and city prefixes to make it look like a call you're receiving is coming from nearby. The whole objective, the BBB says, is to get you to answer.

That's the only way the scammer can start a conversation with you. And even if you hang up immediately, the calling system still records your phone as

an active number, which puts it on a list of known targets for future calls.

In other cases, the Better Business Bureau says, the number displays as coming from a local business or person with which you've previously communicated.

Answering one of these caller ID spoofed calls will indicate to the robocaller that you have an active phone line. Active phone lines are valuable to phone scammers and will often put you on what is referred to as a "sucker list," potentially opening your phone line up to more scam calls. But some targets like to take the opportunity to mess with the callers.

"I flip it," said Cecillie Stipp.



While there we visited and toured the amazing Seelye Mansion. One of the many things we saw a private collection of over 700 Nutcracker Dolls. There was one from every state in the U.S.A. plus hundreds of countries around the world.

The picture you are seeing in this column is the collection belonging to our daughter Darla K Johnson of Bailey Island, Maine.

Exactly what is a Nutcracker Doll? Nutcracker dolls, also known as Christmas nutcrackers, are decorative figurines most commonly made to resemble a toy soldier. Nutcracker dolls originated in Germany in the late 17th century.

Friedrich Wilhelm Fuchtnr, commonly known in Germany as "father of the nutcracker" began the first mass production of the design in 1872. The dolls are symbols of good luck. They were and still are given as gifts, and at some point they

became associated with the Christmas season. The very famous ballet, called "The Nutcracker" introduced during the mid 20th century, became a favorite holiday tradition across the United States and helped make nutcracker dolls a Christmas decoration.

While nearly all nut-

cracker dolls from before the first half of the 20th century are functional, a significant proportion of modern nutcracker dolls are primarily decorative, and not able to crack nuts.

presently \$12.50. There were no fees to use the Flint Hills Trail, according to the kanzatrails.org website.

"We hope this serves as a great incentive for state park visitors and trail enthusiasts to visit these two truly unique trails," said Kansas State Parks director Linda Lanterman. "Our state parks have some really phenomenal trails, and I think people are going to be especially surprised by these two in particular."

KDWT officials did not note if concerns had been raised about declining use of the trails.

At more than 50 miles long, Prairie Spirit Trail State Park

is a linear park spanning three counties from Ottawa through Garnett to Iola. It was Kansas' first "rail trail" with the first section from Richmond to Welda finished in 1996. The trail was taken over by state authorities after the old Santa Fe Railroad line was legally abandoned by the railroad and "rail banked" under federal authority to preserve the unbroken railroad corridor. Numerous other trails in the U.S. were initiated in the same manner. The Prairie Spirit added sections from Richmond to Ottawa and Welda to Iola in subsequent years over opposition from some adjoining landowners.

With its full 50-mile stretch, Prairie Spirit Trail users can

stop and enjoy the local hospitality of 10 rural communities and eight pocket-parks - mini parks created typically in downtown areas on lots where buildings once stood or on odd portions of land - along its path.

The Flint Hills Trail State Park is the longest trail in Kansas and the seventh-longest rail-trail in America, stretching 117 miles. The trail runs east to west, from Osawatimie to Herington, passing through the communities of Rantoul, Ottawa, Pomona, Vassar, Osage City, Miller, Admire, Allen, Bushong, and Council Grove along the way. Flint Hills Trail users may be interested to know the path follows the general route of the Santa Fe National Historic Trail, and forms a component of the coast-to-coast American Discovery Trail.

"Tell them they've reached the call center I work for, and then I try to sell the caller remodeling or home repair services instead. I had one on the line for 21 minutes once before he finally gave up and ended the call. Gets you off their call list."

"I just stopped answering and block the number. Most every one knows to text me since I'm usually always at work," said former Garnett resident Shelly Riley.

Some cell service providers provide options for blocking and reporting those calls as well.

"We are able to set up our cell phones to only allow calls in our contact list to ring through," said Karen Wolken of Garnett. "Most of the time if it is a robo call a voicemail message isn't left. Only downside is if someone legitimate is trying to call you it won't ring, but they can leave a voicemail message."

"My phone has the option to

label a call and send reports," said Cecil Elliott II of Bush City. "I already always send reports on my spam calls and then block it outright."

Some phone apps also offer options, like one Monte Mahan of Greeley uses.

"I use an app called 'Calls Blacklist,'" Mahan said "It blocks all calls not in your contacts list. It will let someone leave a voice mail. Easy to turn off if you're expecting a legitimate call. Works great for me."

The Better Business Bureau offers these tips to help identify and handle "neighbor spoofing" phone calls:

- Avoid answering calls from phone numbers you don't recognize, even if they appear to be local. If it's important, the caller will leave a message.

- If your own phone number is used in a caller ID spoof call, you may receive calls and messages from people asking why you called them in the first place. This can lead to a lot of confu-

sion between the two parties, but knowing your own number can be used by scammers may help explain the situation.

- Be aware that phone numbers of local businesses, including doctor's offices and/or insurance agents, may appear to be calling you. If you're not certain whether the call is legitimate or a spoof, hang up and dial the known phone number for the contact to verify the communication, especially if personal and/or financial information is being requested.

- There are call blocking apps that may help decrease the amount of spam calls, including those using a spoof caller ID. Your phone carrier may also provide a similar service or offer advice.

- Make sure your phone number is on the National Do Not Call Registry. Though it is unlikely to prevent most phone scam calls, it will help to reduce calls received from legitimate telemarketers, which can be helpful in screening fraudulent calls.

Regardless of this ongoing change, care for the land and this critical resource continues to improve. Today's farmers are increasing the amount of organic matter in their soil. With no-till and reduced tillage farming, farmers continue to build organic matter and improve the soil tilth. There is no reason to believe this practice will be discontinued.

Today's modern farmer is not exhausting the land. Just the opposite is true.

Without question scarce water is always a concern, especially in Midwestern states where rainfall is limited, and people use plenty of it. Farmers constantly chart rainfall amounts and monitor weather conditions. In Kansas, agricultural producers are aware of changes in the Ogallala Aquifer.

Farmers are very much tuned into water and the conservation of this vital resource. Some are concerned about the potential of a long-term climate change.

Barring a major shift in our

climate, crops will continue to be planted in western Kansas. Production could be less than now, but this land will be farmed and farmed wisely.

At the same time, the world's population is exploding. Some say the greatest growth in the history of our world is underway.

World population is projected to reach 9.7 billion by 2050. The current world population of 7.3 billion is expected to reach 8.5 billion by 2030 and 11.2 billion in 2100. Most of these people will be born in the hungry parts of the world.
