Mail-in election enters final week

Decision on 5-member city commission change to be rendered Aug. 14

GARNETT – Registered voters in the city have until next Wednesday, August 14, to have their votes counted to determine whether Garnett will expand to a five member or remain with a three member city commission.

Ballots in the mail ballot election were mailed July 25, with a return deadline of 12 noon Wednesday, August 14. Any registered voter who did not receive a ballot in the mail and wants to cast a vote on the issue should contact the Anderson County

Clerk's office at (785) 448-6841.

County clerk Julie Wettstein said only a half dozen new voters registered in time for the mail-out election between July 15 and 24. As of last week some 400 ballots had been returned, she said. Some 1,020 voters, according to initial vote totals, cast votes and approved the measure 53-47 percent when the advisory question was voted in November 2018.

The issue has been a point of contention between city commissioners and members of the public since commissioner Brigitte Brecheisen-Huss drummed up the idea and the commission voted to place it on an advisory ballot in the fall 2018 election. The measure passed by some 50

Tax delinquencies see marked decline

Threat of upcoming tax sale probably motivated some payments

GARNETT – Both the amount of delinquent taxes owed to Anderson County and the number of parcels involved are down as of the 2018 tax payment deadline – probably the result of a more aggressive stance by the county in pressing tax foreclosure efforts.

The list of 2018 delinquencies published on pages 2B & 3B reflects a total of 482 parcels, down from 533 last year, with total tax owed at \$328,769 compared to \$398,004 last year. It's the first drop in delinquent taxes in recent years.

The list includes properties processed and set for foreclosure and liquidation in a county tax sale recently published

and expected to be held in September. Harold Deforest with the Anderson County Treasurer's office said six of the last 23 parcels that have been removed from that scheduled tax sale had the taxes paid in full, which accounts for some of the reduction in tax owed overall between the two years.

"In a nutshell, there were 51 less parcels and \$69,234.80 less in total delinquent taxes this year," Deforest said.

Delinquent parcels and taxes had climbed the past two years, including a 24 increase in delinquencies owed from 2016 compared to 2015. The \$398,000 figure last year was the highest since the immediate post-recession summation in 2010, when county county taxpayers still owed \$372,347.

In reality the list, published every August after the previous year's closing tax deadline,

McCullar pleads on two counts

Sentencing for making, possessing child porn set for this October in Neb.

LINCOLN, Neb. – The former Garnett man facing federal child pornography charges in Nebraska will be sentenced October 25, after cutting a deal with federal prosecutors last week.

Michael Dean McCullar, 47 of Dwight, Neb., and formerly of Garnett, pled guilty to two of four counts against him in exchange for prosecutors dropping the other two.

McCullar was indicted in February on a charge of production of child pornography, two counts of distribution of child pornography and one count of possession of child porn. Under the plea agreement reached last week, McCullar pled guilty to one count of production of child porn and a single count of possession, throwing out both charges of distribution. Maximum sentences can include fines up to \$250,000 and imprisonment of up to 20 years on

each count.

McCullar was arrested during a Florida business trip in February, after Homeland Security Investigators over a series of months identified him in an Internet sting operation as a deep web persona offering to sell or trade nude photos of a girl they estimated about two years of age. On October 25, 2018, Homeland Security officers in Boston were able

to procure 10 photographs of the child being exploited by a white man with dark arm hair wearing a wedding ring. The photos were provided by a username later identified as McCullar through his internet connection.

Investigators were able to ascertain a fingerprint from the photo of one of the hands in the photos which was run through two crime data bases. Both came back negative.

Officers confirmed with McCullar's wife, Christine McCullar, the identity of the child as her niece, whom she said Mike McCullar had

periodic access to. In his anonymous conversations with officers online, McCullar said he had been abusing the girl since she was eight months old, but planned to cease the activities when she got older so she couldn't report the abuse.

A probable cause affidavit used as a basis for McCullar's arrest and obtained by the Review said Christine McCullar identified other background items from the photos shown to her, like a blanket and bed pillows, that provided further evidence in her husband's arrest and charges.

McCullar was a regional manager for a national medical services company and worked from his home in Garnett before moving to Nebraska several years ago. At one time he was chairman of the Anderson County Republican Party.

Congress determines maximum and sometimes minimum penalties for every federal crime by statute, with certain ranges determined between those parameters. Judges may consider various information during their deliberation to come up with a sentence determination.

Schmidt wins back Obamacare fees charged to State of Kansas

TOPEKA – The federal government must repay Kansas more than \$56 million for illegally collecting an Obamacare fee from the state over a three-year period, a federal district court judge in Texas ruled yesterday.

In 2015, Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt and five other states sued the federal government, arguing that the Health Insurance Provider (HIP) Fee – one of the numerous taxes and fees imposed by the Affordable Care Act, or "Obamacare" – was being illegally collected from their state treasuries. Federal statute expressly prohibits the imposition of the HIP fee on states. But in states like Kansas that contract with private managed care organizations (MCOs) to operate their Medicaid programs, the federal government imposed the fee on the MCOs, then adopted a regulation requiring the MCOs to pass the cost of the HIP fee through to the state.

"As we've argued from the beginning of this case, the two-step HIP Fee scheme illegally taxes treasuries in states like Kansas to pay for federal expenditures, and the unlawfully collected amounts must be returned to the states," Schmidt said. "We've

thought this was illegal, and the court has agreed."

Federal District Judge Reed O'Connor ruled in March 2018 that the regulation mandating the MCOs pass the cost of the HIP fee through to the states was illegal. In August 2018, the judge ordered the federal government to return to the states the money it had illegally collected.

Since then, the states and the federal government have been in discussions about the amount of money at issue. For Kansas, the court originally identified more than \$142 million in total payments illegally collected, but a portion of that was paid by the state with federal funds. The \$56,555,998 now entered in final judgment for Kansas is the net amount paid from state taxpayer funds over the three-year period for Fee Years 2014-2016. The federal government has now agreed not to challenge the amount of money to be returned to Kansas under yesterday's judgment – it will only appeal whether the payment must be made at all.

The federal government suspended collection of the fee in Fee Year 2017. Kansas filed a second lawsuit challeng-

votes, and commissioner Jody Cole opposed Huss and Greg Gwin in their efforts to codify the advisory election vote into a revised city charter by circulating a petition to force the measure to a binding vote. That petition succeeded, which spawned the mail ballot election.

Even the form of the election erupted into discord when city attorney Terry Solander counseled the commission that the vote needed to be conducted as a walk-in election at the polls, per the Kansas Constitution in dealing with charter ordinance votes. Holding the election as a mail-in vote, Solander said, risked litigation based on those grounds and the possible recension of the vote if such a suit succeeded in court. Huss and Gwin ignored Solander's protest and voted 2-1 against Cole to pursue the mail-in vote anyway.

Cole has said she opposes the expansion due to added costs of some \$11,000 per year for com-

missioners' salaries. Huss said she proposed the measure to broaden resident representation on the commission, and Gwin said while he did not initially support the idea, he was convinced by the Fall 2018 advisory vote to support the measure because that's what the public had voted for.

If the measure fails, the present three-member system remains unchanged. If the measure passes, the city will create two additional positions on the governing body which will be elected in the fall of 2020 and take office in January 2021. Two seats will then be elected in 2022, one of them the seat currently held by Huss, which would be extended a year from its regularly scheduled election date of 2021. All terms would be three years, with the staggered election adapting to a 2-2-1 scheme. The system would allow the two new commissioners to have time with the three experienced seat holders in order to get oriented to their positions.

ing collection of the fee for Fee Year 2018, and that remains pending in federal district court in Texas. That second lawsuit is likely to remain on hold while an appeal in the first suit is considered.

The federal government is appealing the judgment entered yesterday, arguing even if the fee was illegally collected it is not liable to return the illegally collected funds to the states. With the finalized judgment entered yesterday, the federal government is ordered to return the money to Kansas, but that order is stayed temporarily while the court considers whether to give the federal government time to appeal before it must pay.

"We will now shift our attention to preserving our judgment

on appeal," Schmidt said. "The federal government continues to fight our claim to recover these illegally collected funds, so Kansas cannot yet count on this money being available."

The federal government's appeal will be heard in the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans. In addition to Kansas, the states that brought this lawsuit are Texas, Indiana, Louisiana, Nebraska and Wisconsin. The finalized judgment requires the federal government to return more than \$479 million to the six states that brought the lawsuit.

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How are we to build the church?

We often wonder how we are to build the church? I believe Jesus left us the perfect example in Acts 2:42-47. The early church was also a sharing community. “All the believers were together and had everything in common. Selling their possessions and goods, they gave to anyone as he had need.” (2:44-45) I believe what Luke is saying here is very much what should take place today. Out of what the church collected they reinvested into the people and to others who were not necessarily part of the community but had legitimate needs.

We read the early church was a worshipping community. “Every day they continued to meet together in the temple

courts.” (2:46) By meeting regularly the community of believers was able to strengthen their communal bond. I believe this is similar to the small group approach the church has tried to adopt today.

We read the early church was a multi-cultural community. “They broke bread together in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people.” In the early church the direction of worship was directly toward God. Much of our worship today consists of watching. Most people never touch a Bible or a hymnal as everything is presented on a screen. In one sense this can detract from our worship of God.

We read the early church was a growing community. “And the Lord added to their

number daily those who were being saved.” (2:47b) Acts 4:4 tells us ‘But many who heard the message believed, and the number of men grew to about five thousand.’

Growing the church is difficult. We may see an unsaved person walk through the door of the church, become convicted by the Holy Spirit and receive Jesus Christ as their Savior. We rejoice with them but often leave them without an answer to their next question. What do I do now? This is where the early church excelled

because it was a community of believers with only one aim, to praise God. In order to grow the church we must prepare each person to be able to fulfill 1st Peter 3:15. “Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have.”

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Needed- A well regulated militia

The wailing of the political news cycle after a weekend in which psychopaths murdered 29 people in two separate mass shootings in Ohio and Texas may drown out the cries of the family and friends of Erin Langhofer.

The 25 year-old therapist at a domestic violence center was hit by a stray bullet last Friday night in a crowd at the First Fridays event in Kansas City's Crossroads Arts District. She died later at a hospital. Cops in the immediate area, reacting to the sound of gunfire, ran after 19 year-old Deon'te Copkney as he fled the scene. Copkney dropped a 9mm handgun before he hit the ground on the order of police. He's now charged with the woman's murder.

He was fighting with others at the event near the food trucks near where Langhofer was shot, he said. He fire as he ran from the fight, emptying the weapon's magazine as he ran at whoever he said had attacked him. He never intended to hurt an innocent person, he said.

Though they mass the nation's conscience and attention for a time, horrors like the two within 13 hours of each other last weekend in Dayton and El Paso kill only a fraction of those slain every year by regular old gun violence. But it is the media buzz around these incidents and the resulting preening and posturing by politicians and special interests that drive the political discourse, until of course the juice runs out of the issue everyone goes back to doing what they did before - nothing.

Meanwhile the urban thugery which infests our country in cities like Chicago, Kansas City, etc., drives the bulk of the nation's body count. Erin Langhofer was one of six in KC last week alone.

Thug violence is a separate issue from that of the sick, tortured deviants who plan mass shootings, but the fact that both continue seemingly unabated lends to the sentiment that no one can really help us but us.

In the days just prior to Kansas' statehood



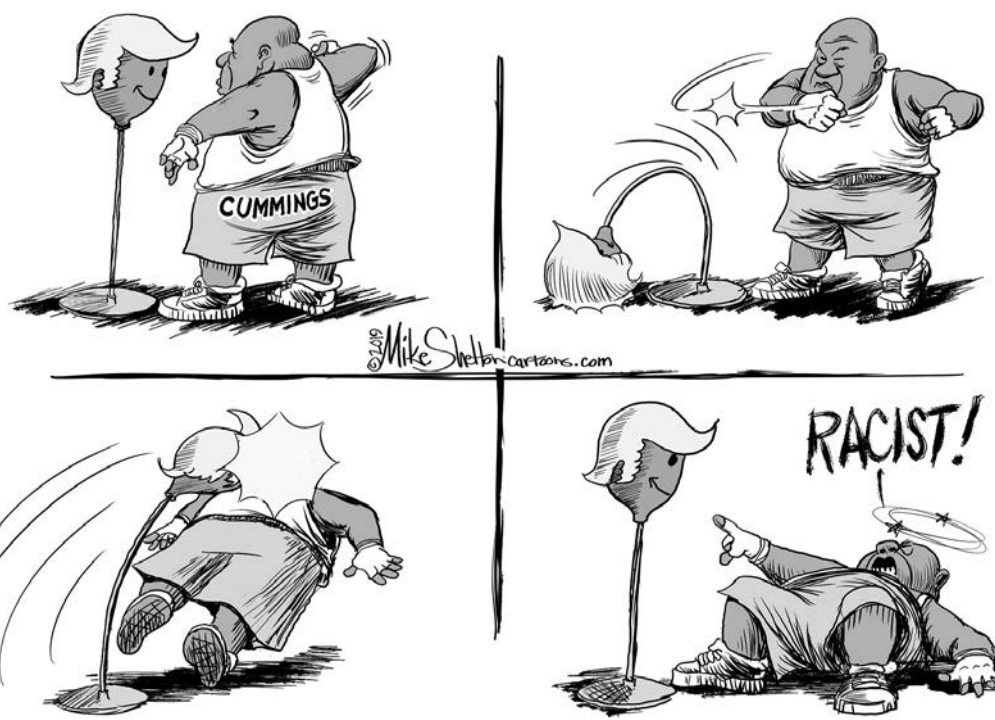
and elsewhere, communities rallied men and their weapons to serve as their own "well regulated" militia to defend against attacks by marauders and provide support to law enforcement where it was out-gunned. It's hard to deny the similarities between the challenges faced then and those of today, when despite their best efforts police and government bureaucracies charged to protect us clearly fail with such frequency.

Are we moving back to the days that once justified citizen volunteers to arm themselves and organize their own patrols of trouble spots and events like a First Fridays promotion, relying on their own street-smart biases and legally unfettered judgments to pick out thugs to surveil before trouble erupts? Must communities, students and parents outside law enforcement, start assembling lists of those whose behaviors and social media interactions cause concern?

That's an uneasy thought for both law enforcement and many of our neighbors.

But what we know is our reliance on age-old measures of law enforcement and bureaucracy leaves vast holes in our security in the face of modern threats. If anything can be done, it may depend on us. ###

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Care about the planet? Don't ban fracking

Washington Governor Jay Inslee recently signed a permanent statewide ban on fracking, the drilling technique that has made America the world's top producer of natural gas. And Senator Bernie Sanders just called for a nationwide fracking ban.

Both these 2020 presidential candidates believe that banning fracking will help fight climate change. They're dead wrong.

Fracking actually drives down carbon emissions by unlocking new stores of natural gas -- the cleanest burning fossil fuel. Rather than ban fracking, pragmatic environmentalists ought to embrace it.

Fracking enables energy companies to tap natural gas reserves in underground shale rock formations. Our natural gas output has spiked 50 percent since 1990.

As natural gas became more abundant, prices plummeted. Many power plants abandoned coal and switched en masse to this cheaper fuel. Today, 35 percent of America's electricity comes from natural gas, while just 27 percent comes from coal. At the turn of the century, coal provided half of America's electricity -- natural gas provided just 16 percent.

The transition away from coal has been great for the environment since burned natural gas produces only half as much carbon dioxide as burned coal.

Thanks largely to our increased reliance on natural gas, the United States leads the world in cutting carbon emissions. U.S. car-



bon dioxide emissions are near the lowest point they've been in 25 years. Large power plants reduced their emissions by 4.5 percent from 2016 to 2017.

Fracking bans would reverse this progress. If natural gas hadn't begun to displace coal, 2018 emissions would have been 15 percent higher, according to the International Energy Agency.

Despite the drop in emissions, many environmentalists still oppose fracking. They claim the technique toxifies soil and groundwater and releases harmful pollutants into the air. But government research, including a study by the Environmental Protection Agency, has found that such contamination is exceedingly rare.

Activists also claim that fracking compa-

How can Mitch McConnell be a Russian spy?

There was a time when the left considered McCarthyism the worst of all political tactics. That was before it became useful to question Mitch McConnell's loyalty to his country.

The Senate majority leader's offense is blocking Democratic-sponsored election security bills, which has occasioned the sort of charges that Democrats have spent the better half of the past 50 years ruling out of bounds.

The Washington Post headlined a column, "Mitch McConnell is a Russian asset." It wasn't tongue-in-cheek. "Let's," urged Post columnist Dana Milbank, "call this what it is: unpatriotic. The Kentucky Republican is, arguably more than any other American, doing Russian President Vladimir Putin's bidding."

Rep. John Sarbanes, D-Md., said supporting the bills was an opportunity for McConnell "to do the right thing in terms of demonstrating his patriotism." A CNN national security analyst declared, "I believe the only reason Mitch McConnell is doing this is that he believes Donald Trump cannot win without the Russians' help." MSNBC host Joe Scarborough dubbed McConnell "Moscow Mitch," a moniker that trended on Twitter and substituted alliteration for thought.

The occasion for the assault on McConnell was a naked and cynical political setup. After Robert Mueller's testimony, Democrats tried to get so-called unanimous consent for election security bills in the Senate. This procedure is reserved for uncontroversial items



that, as you might guess, have unanimous support. While everyone in the Senate agrees we should combat Russian interference, not everyone agrees on how to do it.

One of the Democratic bills would mandate the use of paper ballots as a fail-safe against hacking. This may well be the best practice, but running elections is the responsibility of states and localities, not the federal government. As supporters of state prerogatives, Republicans could be expected to oppose the bill, and sure enough it only got one Republican vote in the House.

Another bill would require campaigns to report offers of foreign assistance, a superficially appealing idea. Yet, the more compre-

hensive such a bill is, the more likely it is to sweep up minor and innocent interactions that fall far short of the infamous Trump Tower meeting (that itself came to nothing).

There's no need to reach for extravagant explanations for why McConnell would oppose these bills (He's a tool of the Kremlin! He hopes his Moscow minders will put Trump over the top in 2020!). The Kentucky senator has an extensive record as an opponent of federal activism and of poorly drafted campaign reform bills.

What the case against McConnell comes down to is the usual sophomoric Washington argument that if you don't want to do this one specific thing, you don't want to do anything and have the worst possible intentions.

McConnell supported the \$380 million to aid in election security funding that passed Congress. And he supported the bipartisan Senate Intelligence Committee investigation into election interference that produced an alarming public report late last month.

As McConnell pointed out in a peppery defense of his record on the Senate floor, he's been a Russian hawk going back to the Reagan administration, and has continued to call out Putin since 2016.

He doesn't need lessons from anyone about how to be clear-eyed about Russia, let alone how to be patriotic.

always includes "lost" properties in which firm ownership is in question, owners may be deceased or owners are simply chronic delinquents who've shown no interest in paying. The difference this year, the data hints, is that the threat of an impending foreclosure and sale of some of those properties prompts owners of more valuable delinquent parcels to pay up and clear the slate before the properties are seized and sold for the taxes owed.

State laws allow counties to foreclose on and sell properties for not paying their taxes, but the process requires lengthy research and notification which adds to its expense. However, Anderson County Commissioners in recent years have been more aggressive in pursuing those periodic sales, with the idea of selling the delinquent properties to new owners, even at a loss, to hopefully get them back on the paying tax rolls.
