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Fair kicks off with parade tonight

GARNETT – The Anderson County Fair springs to life tonight with the traditional parade kickoff to be followed by a week of entertainment and exhibitions of local agricultural endeavor.

Today's highlights also include a morning of activities including the (see the fairbook or website www.adersoncofair.com for times) swine show, rabbit show and judging of 4-H and Open Class Exhibits and Boy & Girl Scout exhibits. The community building will close at noon for judging and reopen at 3 p.m. for exhibit viewing. The poultry show is this afternoon with parade time set for 7 p.m. at Garnett Stadium. Inflatable amusements are also on the midway Tuesday evening.

Grand marshal for tonight's parade is longtime area cattleman, 4-H supporter and District I Anderson County Commissioner Les McGhee of Kincaid.

Wednesday's lineup includes the meat goat show Wednesday morning, pie contest entries and judging in the afternoon with evening events to include the Merchant's Tent, community committee career fair, sheep show, GSSB kids cash grab,

Poll: Majority support amendment passage

Tight race appears to lean toward supporters; most opposition is younger

TOPEKA – A poll of Kansas voters shows they narrowly favor passage of the "Value Them Both" Amendment on next week's primary ballot.

Anderson County voters join other Kansans at the voting polls Tuesday to decide whether a 2019 Kansas Supreme Court assertion that the state's constitution includes an unspecified but nevertheless present right to have an abortion should remain law in Kansas. Passage of the amendment could lead to further legislation on abortion in the state, which pro-abortion activists fear would amount to a total ban or additional restrictions.

Presently in Kansas, abortion is legal as long as it's practiced by a licensed physician within the first 22 weeks unless a complication threatens the life of the mother. Partial Birth abortion procedures are banned, and the law allows public funding for abortions only in cases of rape, incest or threat to the life of the mother.

Results of a Co/efficient poll release by the polling data website FiveThirtyEight show 47 percent of 1,500 Kansas voters polled support the Value Them Both Amendment with 43 percent opposed to it, with 10 percent undecided. FiveThirtyEight reports that Co/efficient Polling has conducted five polls in political races and been correct in 80 percent of those. FiveThirtyEight is owned by ESPN, which itself is owned by Disney.

In parts of Anderson County a number of VTB supporters told the Review they'd had signs supporting

attitudes on the amendment shows 47 percent in favor of the amendment, 43 percent against with 10 percent undecided. Voters head to the polls next Tuesday.

the measure placed on their property and that a number of them had been defaced in recent days. Anderson County Sheriff Vern Valentine said he had received no official reports of property damage locally due to the

defacing of political signs.

Kansas' decision on VTB will be the first statewide referendum dealing with abortion since the U.S. Supreme Court overturned the landmark Roe v. Wade abortion deci-

sion in June, which did away with federal jurisdiction over abortion and cast the issue back for determination by individual states. Kansas

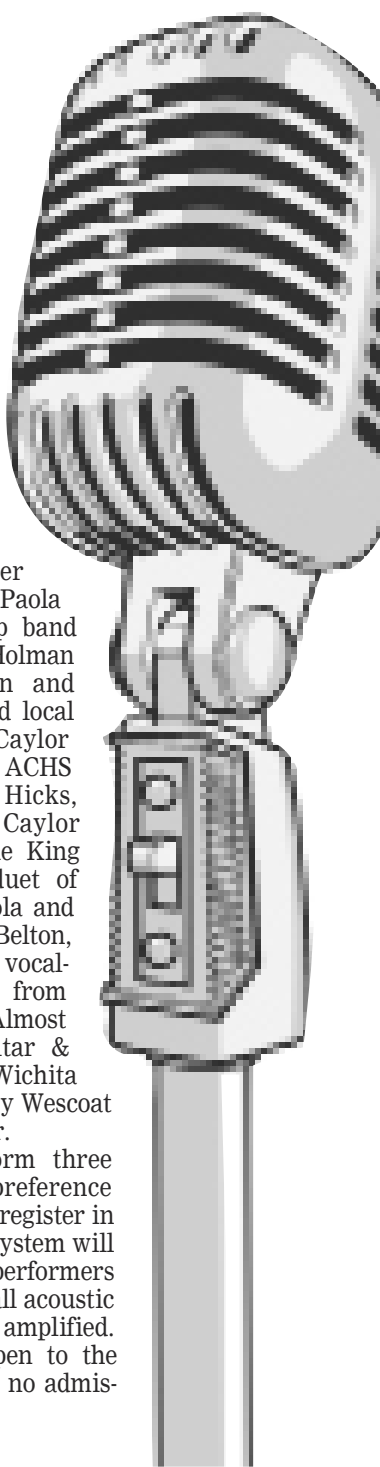
"It's been pretty amazing to see how word's gotten around," Hicks said. "There are some very talented performers out there who are looking for a little stage time and we're

Tuesday's primary brings choices for Democrats, Republicans in party races

Six Democrats seek nod to challenge Jerry Moran for U.S. Senate

TOPEKA – Democrats and Republicans in Anderson County will vote their separate party choices on Tuesday for candidates to head into the November election.

Democrats post two party members vying for election as Kansas Governor as Governor Laura Kelly closes her first term. The incumbent ticket of Kelly and lieutenant governor David Toland will face a primary chal-

lenge from Richard Karnowski and Barry Franco.

No less than six Democrats are vying for the chance to unseat Republican incumbent Jerry Moran in Moran's U.S. Senate seat. Democrats running include Mike Andra from Wichita, Paul Buskirk of Lawrence, Mark Holland of Kansas City, Ks., Robert Klingenberg of Salina, Michael Soetaert of Alta Vista and Patrick Wiesner of Overland Park.

Republicans have more contention for posts within their ranks in 2022. In the U.S. House District 3 race Amanda Adkins of Overland Park is pitted against John McCaughrean of Kansas City, Ks. For governor, Kansas

Attorney General Derek Schmidt is running against Arlyn Briggs of Kincaid. Mike Brown of OPK opposes incumbent Scott Schwab of KCK for Kansas Secretary of State. Kris Kobach of Lecompton, Tony Mattivi of Topkea and Kellie Warren of Leawood vye for Attorney General. District 108 State Representative Steve Johnson of Assaria is running against 12th District Senator Caryn Tyson for Kansas State Treasurer.

On the Kansas State Board of Education for District 9, which includes Anderson County, Luke Aichele of McPherson is running against incumbent Jim Porter

Schmidt, other AGs win temporary halt to Biden transgender preference mandate

TOPEKA – A federal district court has issued a temporary injunction prohibiting so-called "transgender" individuals from federal protections to use bathrooms and compete in sports that follow their proclaimed sexual identity.

The Biden administration by executive order endorsed a new, expansive and much debated application of federal law early in Biden's presidency. Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt was one of 20 states attorneys general to oppose the mandate.

A judge in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Tennessee granted an injunction sought by Schmidt and the other state officials halting enforcement of guidance issued by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) and the Department of Education against the plaintiff states.

The guidance from the court purports to resolve highly controversial issues, such as whether schools must allow biological males to compete on girls' sports teams, whether employers and

schools may maintain sex-separated showers and locker rooms, and whether individuals may be compelled by the government to use another person's preferred pronouns.

Schmidt said the federal court correctly recognized that the Biden administration was illegally attempting to expand the scope of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in Bostock v. Clayton County. The Bostock decision was narrowly focused on employ-

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. 5003

A PROPOSITION to amend the bill of rights of the constitution of the state of Kansas by adding a new section thereto stating that there is no constitutional right to abortion, and reserving to the people the ability to regulate abortion through the elected members of the legislature of the state of Kansas.

WHEREAS, This proposition to amend the bill of rights of the constitution of the state of Kansas shall be known and may be cited as the Value Them Both Amendment.

Now, therefore:
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate concurring therein:

Section 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: The bill of rights of the constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby amended by adding a new section to read as follows:

“§ 22. **Regulation of abortion.** Because Kansans value both women and children, the constitution of the state of Kansas does not require government funding of abortion and does not create or secure a right to abortion. To the extent permitted by the constitution of the United States, the people, through their elected state representatives and state senators, may pass laws regarding abortion, including, but not limited to, laws that account for circumstances of pregnancy resulting from rape or incest, or circumstances of necessity to save the life of the mother.”

Sec. 2. The following statement shall be printed on the ballot with the amendment as a whole:

“*Explanatory statement.* The Value Them Both Amendment would affirm there is no Kansas constitutional right to abortion or to require the government funding of abortion, and would reserve to the people of Kansas, through their elected state legislators, the right to pass laws to regulate abortion, including, but not limited to, in circumstances of pregnancy resulting from rape or incest, or when necessary to save the life of the mother.

“A vote for the Value Them Both Amendment would affirm there is no Kansas constitutional right to abortion or to require the government funding of abortion, and would reserve to the people of Kansas, through their elected state legislators, the right to pass laws to regulate abortion.

“A vote against the Value Them Both Amendment would make no changes to the constitution of the state of Kansas, and could restrict the people, through their elected state legislators from regulating abortion by leaving in place the recently recognized right to abortion.”

Sec. 3. This resolution, if approved by two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives, and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate shall be entered on the journals, together with the yeas and nays. The secretary of state shall cause this resolution to be published as provided by law and shall cause the proposed amendment to be submitted to the electors of the state at a special election which is hereby called on August 2, 2022, pursuant to section 1 of article 14 of the constitution of the state of Kansas, to be held in conjunction with the primary election held on such date.

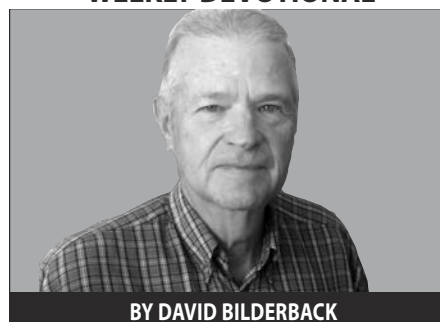

The Church of Christ is the lamp stand to the nations

God called for himself a people out of Egypt. Israel had been a lamp stand but when they forsook their call to be a light to the nations their lamp stand was removed and the church in Christ continued the role of the true Israel. The primary meaning of lamp stand here is that of becoming a witness to the nations. From the time of the Egyptian exodus approximately 1280 B. C. to the birth of Jesus Israel was the chosen people. The birth of Jesus introduced what is referred to as the New Covenant. When the Jews refused to follow the teachings of Jesus he began to turn his attention to the Gentiles. That is those who were not of Jewish origin.

Jesus tells an interesting parable in Matthew 13:1-15 concerning those who refuse to follow his teaching which culminates in this statement. "You will be ever hearing but never understanding ; you will be ever seeing but never perceiving. For this peoples heart has become calloused; they hardly hear with their ears and they have closed their eyes. Otherwise they might see with their eyes, hear with their hearts and turn, and I would heal them."

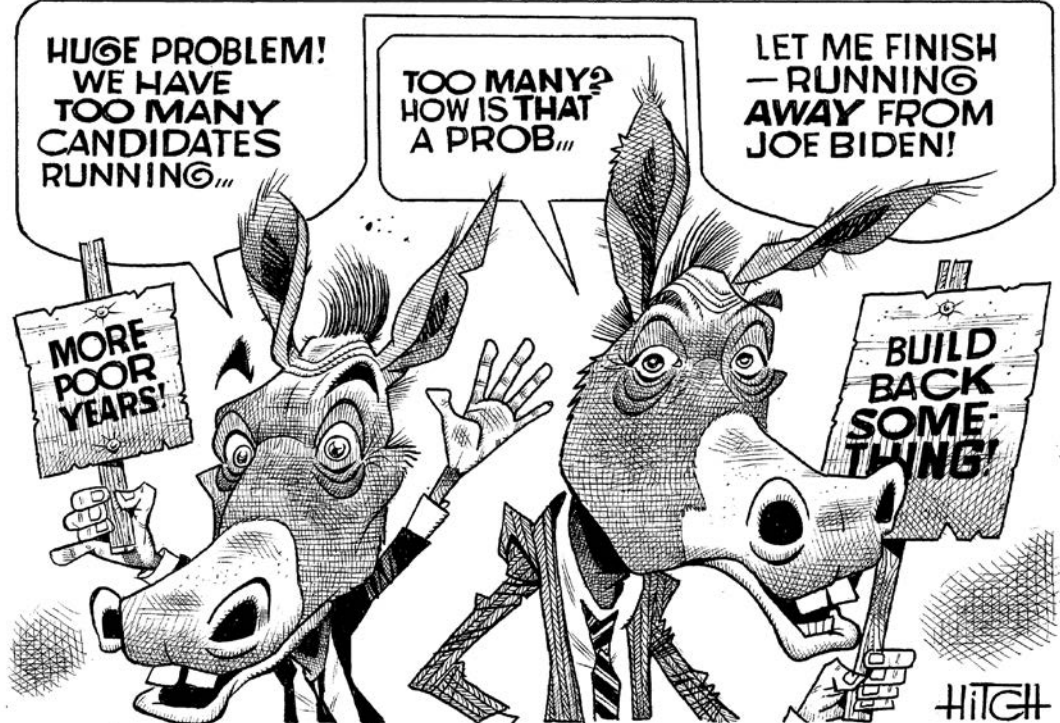

KASB report: New version of Emperor's New Clothes

In Hans Christian Andersen's The Emperor's New Clothes, two swindlers arrive at the capital city of an emperor who spends lavishly on clothing at the expense of everything else. Posing as weavers, they offer to supply him with magnificent clothes that are invisible to those who are stupid or incompetent.

The Kansas version of Andersen's tale is the Kansas Association of School Board's preposterous claim that student achievement in the Sunflower State is among the ten best in the nation. Posing as responsible educators, KASB officials consciously deceive unsuspecting school board members, legislators, and parents with breathtaking proclamations of magnificent achievement that result from lavish spending. And those who don't believe their astonishing discovery are branded as anti-public-education kid-haters.

The KASB report is by no means an isolated incident; it is symptomatic of disregard for academic preparation throughout the public education system.

By every measure of academic preparation, Kansas is below average in a country that doesn't perform well.

The most recent results from the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) show the best ranking for Kansas is #19 in

fourth-grade math for students who are not low-income. And having only 57% of those students proficient is not a chest-thumping outcome.

The rankings on the other seven measurements range from the mid-20s to the low-30s. Less than a quarter of low-income students are proficient, and less than half of their more affluent peers are proficient.

State assessment results show Kansas has more high school students below grade level than proficient, which is reflected in the ACT results. Just one in five Kansas graduates is college-ready in English, Reading, Math, and Science, with rampant race-based educational

discrimination. A quarter of White students are college-ready, but only 9% of Hispanic students and just 5% of Black students. ACT rankings are all in the low-30s.

KASB first published its specious report in 2016, when the Kansas Department of Education began de-emphasizing academic preparation with its "Kansans Can" initiative. The 'can' part is farcical shorthand for "Kansans can lead the world in the success of every student." Student achievement has steadily declined between 2016 and 2019, and it is even worse now. Yet the state board of education refuses to say how many years it will take to get kids to grade level, let alone 'lead the world.'

The methodology is designed to produce its desired outcome. The KASB 'formula' counts things that are not measures of academic preparation, like high school graduation and drop-out rates, and post-secondary education, which collectively account for two-thirds of the overall ranking.

As the late great Walter Williams said, "It's grossly dishonest for the education establishment and politicians to boast about unprecedented graduation rates when the high school diplomas, for the most part, do not represent

The Green Movement: Most self-destructive force

Without a doubt, the climate-obsessed green movement is the most stupidly self-destructive force in the world today, leaving a trail of irrationality and folly wherever it goes.

Consider its recent record of destroying the country of Sri Lanka, making Western Europe needlessly vulnerable to Vladimir Putin's energy blackmail and stoking higher energy prices in the U.S. that have contributed to the fastest decline in real wages in 40 years.

The greens are rapidly making up ground on the socialists as the modern world's foremost economic and social saboteurs (and, of course, the two now work hand in hand).

If a hostile actor were to consider the best way to harm a society from within, it would unquestionably be to increase the sway of climate alarmists and other environmentalists who believe it is their righteous duty to make it harder and more expensive to power a modern economy, as well as to build and grow things.

They seek to throw the gears into reverse on the millennia-long human quest for cheaper, more abundant and more reliable sources of energy, while putting new obstacles in the way of other human endeavor.

Since they are fired by a quasi-religious vision of an existential climate crisis on the verge of ending Planet Earth, they reject cost-benefit analysis, not to mention basic realism. The resulting wreckage is all around us.

Sri Lanka achieved one of the highest ESG, or Environmental, Social and Governance, scores in the world and destroyed its economy in the process. The country banned chemical

fertilizers in April 2021 as it hurtled toward becoming the world's first all-organic country. It proved one small step ahead for environmental pieties and a giant leap backward for Sri Lankan farmers. A large proportion of land went dormant, and production of rice, tea and other crops dropped precipitously. The resulting economic calamity has led to the collapse of the government.

This is basically the Green New Deal in miniature.

Sri Lanka is a small island nation in the Indian Ocean; Germany is a powerhouse in the middle of continental Europe. But the green disease doesn't discriminate on the basis of size or wealth.

For years, Germany pursued a policy of making itself dependent on Russian oil and (especially) gas, while congratulating itself on its great environmental virtue as it closed down nuclear power plants and ramped up renewable sources. Berlin can't say it wasn't

warned of the risks of this approach. Such is the faddish grip of climate orthodoxy that it blew past all the blinking red lights. Sure enough, now Russia may well cut off the supply of gas this winter, at the same time that renewables have proved not ready for prime time (they are too intermittent, among other technical problems that won't be solved anytime soon).

In its wisdom, Germany decided to shut down the source of energy that is clean, reliable and doesn't require dependence on an authoritarian state hostile to the West - namely, nuclear power. It fell prey to the environmental left's superstitious hostility to nuclear. Even now, Germany is going ahead with shuttering its last three plants. It is turning again to coal to try to fill the gap this winter, underlining its disastrous mistake in prematurely eschewing such proven sources of energy in the first place.

Here in the U.S., of course, Biden pledged to "end fossil fuel" back in 2019, a promise - given our prodigious reserves of oil, gas and coal - that would make almost as much sense as Russia or Saudi Arabia pledging to do the same. Even as inflation, with energy prices leading the way, destroys Biden's presidency, he and his supporters are determined to pursue a climate agenda that will drive up costs and create inefficiencies at home while doing next to nothing to affect global temperatures.

It makes no sense, but for the greens, that's never been a particularly important criterion.

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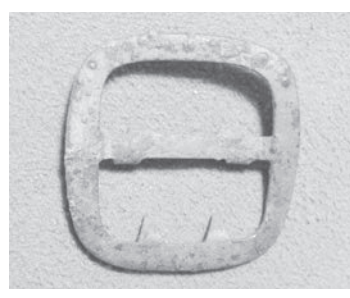
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Well as long as I keep digging for and finding artifacts, I will keep sharing a few photos of my finds. When you get around old home sites, it's no telling what you might find.

academic achievement. At best, they certify attendance."

The Kansas Department of Education gave out ninety-one Gold and Silver Awards last year to districts with high school graduation rates at or above 93%. But how many school districts do you think received Gold or Silver Awards for Academic Preparedness? Just one - on the military base at Fort Leavenworth.

Education officials do students no favors by giving them diplomas when they cannot do

math or read at grade level. But like the KASB report and the Kansans Can campaign, the purpose is not to educate students but to make the public education system look good.

Local school board members collectively divert about \$5 million of what should be classroom spending to fund the Kansas Association of School Boards. But Topeka insiders know that KASB mostly represents the interests of superintendents and the Department of Education.

This latest KASB report is another reminder that improving student achievement is a distant thought in the Kansas

public education system. State and local education officials are on record consciously deceiving legislators about achievement, ignoring state laws designed to improve outcomes for at-risk students and other actions that work against students' needs. B

ottom line: the Kansas public education system will not resolve low achievement if left to its own devices. Legislators must intervene with choice, transparency, and accountability measures.

on employment discrimination and did not address any of the issues covered by the EEOC and Department of Education guidance related to Title IX and Title VII.

"The federal court has recognized this illegal overreach by the Biden administration to unilaterally resolve these sensitive questions that are better addressed by elected represen-

tatives," Schmidt said. "It is clear that the administration is determined to make sweeping one-size-fits-all policy changes without public comment or proper notice."

Schmidt said the guidance from the federal agencies would in effect invalidate state laws across the country and could preclude states from legislating on certain subjects, such as separating sporting competitions by biological sex.

Earlier this year, the Kansas Legislature passed the

Fairness in Women's Sports Act. Although that bill was vetoed by the governor, Kansas and the plaintiff states are fighting to ensure that federal bureaucrats cannot distort federal law to take these types of policy decisions away from elected officials in Kansas.

The federal court injunction prohibits enforcement of the guidelines in Kansas and 19 other states that filed the lawsuit. A copy of the federal court order is available at <https://bit.ly/3uTCb2k>

The Co/efficient poll

showed majority support for the amendment among those age 44 and over, with opposition to the measure heaviest in the younger age brackets under 44. Five percent of those responding to the poll said they wanted a total abortion ban. The poll said 86 reported they were familiar with the amend-

ment. Opponents to the amendment in Kansas have out-raised organizations in favor by \$6.5 million to \$4.7 million for advertising and marketing efforts. The combination is the most ever spent to date on a Kansas constitutional amendment issue.

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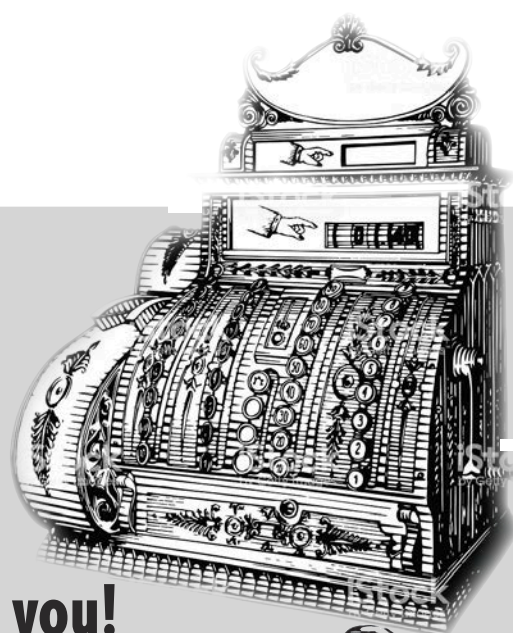
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Kellerman's annual family reunion was July 10

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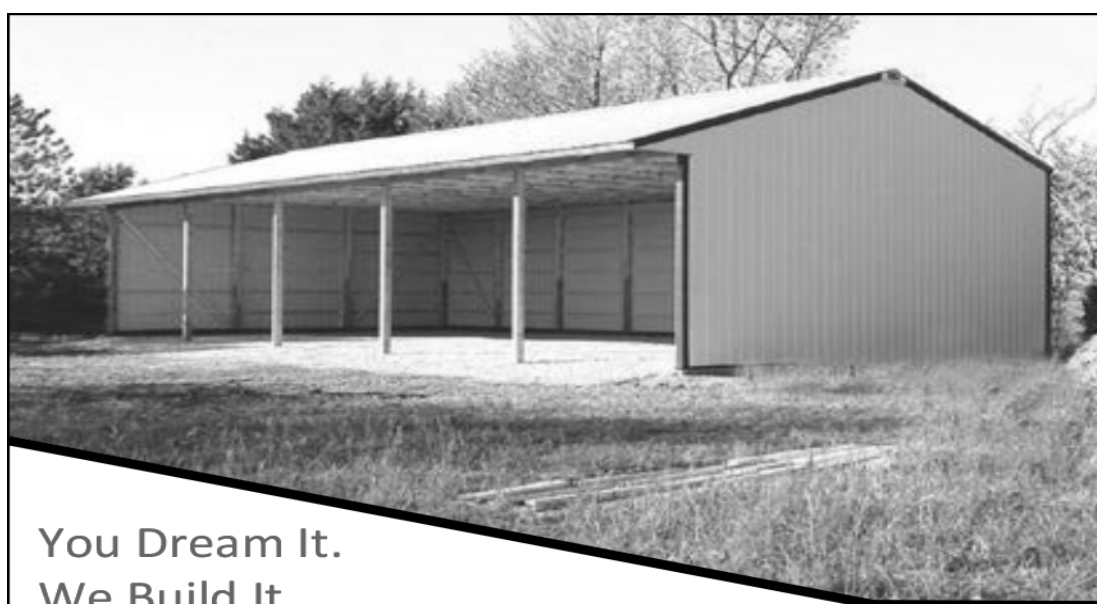

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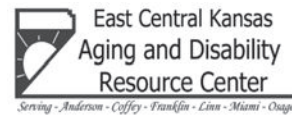
