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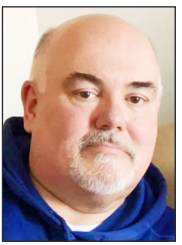
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## Sheriff's race spawns allegations of campaign impropriety, destruction of digital public record

GARNETT - Bitter contention in the 2024 Anderson County Sheriff's race continued to fester last week, with allegations that Anderson County Emergency Preparedness Director and one of two Republican candidates for county sheriff Mark Locke improperly used county facilities in his campaign.

The issue was broached by former Garnett City Commissioner Jason Sheahan, whose contention with Locke was also an issue when they both served on the city governing body more than a year ago. In the most recent row, Sheahan maintains Locke's use of the Anderson County Emergency Preparedness Department

Facebook page to pursue a political discussion with a constituent violated government use protocols, and the deletion of that conversation from the digital medium amounts to a criminal act as the destruction of a public record.

Locke had no comment when contacted about the controversy by the Review late last week.

The issue surrounded a question from a voter posted on the Anderson County Fire and Emergency Management FB page - presumably operated by Locke as the department director. The question on the page was attributed to Donald E. Moyer, "I would like to know how many

jobs can you hold at one time, and if you become sheriff, can you hold another Anderson County job at the same time (?)"

The response, since deleted, is alleged to have come from Locke: "When I become the sheriff it will be the only job I will hold. I already have been working on training personnel to take over my current duties."

Kansas Statute 25-4169a, administered by the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission, prohibits "use of public funds, vehicles, machinery, equipment and supplies and time of certain officers and employees to influence nomination or election of candidate" and defines violations as a misdemeanor.

The latest incident follows recent charges leveled by Locke on social media and at a recent political forum criticizing the

## Weiner finds more job controversy in Missouri

MONETT, Mo. - Former Garnett City Manager Chris Weiner has run into foul waters at the job he took after leaving Garnett, according to Missouri media reports.

Disagreements between Monett, Mo., city commissioners over city operations apparently prompted a plan by Weiner to resign earlier in July according to published reports in the Lawrence County Record. A

video of the July 11 meeting relayed a narrative in which Monett City Commissioners Darren Indovina and Ken Gaspar "closed ranks" and confronted Monett Mayor Randy Burke, repeatedly referring to the mayor as a "bully" for his efforts to issue his own per-

formance reviews and to start the ball rolling to find a replacement for Weiner. Commissioners eventually tabled the formal acceptance of Weiner's resignation and the beginning of the process to fill his position until the August 8 city commission meeting.

Weiner told the newspaper he came to the July 2 meeting with a letter of resignation in his pocket, though he said council members were not aware of his intent

## Commissioners exceed revenue neutral rate in 2025 Garnett budget

August 27 hearing is public's chance to have a say before 2025 spending plan locked in

GARNETT - Members of the public will have the opportunity to weigh in on a 2025 Garnett city budget on August 27 that raises an additional \$30,000 in property taxes and boosts overall spending by \$2.4 million while exceeding the "revenue neutral" tax rate.

City manager Travis Wilson besides the said primary targets included in this year's budget include a major wastewater line project for which the city hopes to acquire grant assistance, refurbishing of baseball fields at Lake Garnett to help drainage and replacement of bleachers at the Legion baseball field. Another city

road project is also planned for the 2025 work year as well, he said.

"We will be looking to do another road project," Wilson said, "we just haven't looked at the transportation plan to see what road is next on the list."

Overall, the 2025 budget document outlines some \$16.5 million in total planned spending for the coming year - about \$2.4 million more than project for 2024 - with a mill levy that exceeds the statutory "revenue neutral rate." The revenue neutral rate is the mill levy that when applied to the current year's assessed property value would produce the same amount of tax money as the prior year. Exceeding that rate requires a special public hearing as well as notification by letter of the action to taxpayers to allow for public comment.

## County to cut another \$33,000 check, but still won't bring veterans memorial to fulfill original promise

Upgrade aimed at change in operation, physical environment

GARNETT - Anderson County Commissioners have approved a quote from their local computer vendor of more than \$30,000 for a fix to the controversial issues plaguing the county Veterans Memorial, but that solution still won't accomplish the memorial's original design, county officials say.

Commissioners earlier this month approved a bid of \$33,688 from Advantage computers for a video scroll that will appear on the memorial kiosks which will be tied into the courthouse server room.

The move is an attempt to rectify performance issues with the original software and computer

hardware purchased from a New Hampshire company when the memorial was built in 2020. That system was designed to provide a touch screen interactive interface similar to numerous other such information kiosks at facilities across the country, which allowed

a search for local veterans with extensive file and data possibilities for each, including photos, scanned documents and videos. But this system was plagued by problems from the beginning and

## County delinquent taxpayers owe \$423,973

Total owed jumps 9% over last year, while county assessment dips slightly

GARNETT - Anderson County Commissioners conduct the annual effort to collect back taxes from county taxpayers today with the public notice of the county's 2023 Delinquent Tax Notice, found on pages 9-11 of today's Review.

Taxpayers owed over 9 percent more in delinquent taxes - \$423,973 on 470 parcels of property in 2023

compared to \$388,095 on 461 tracts in 2022.

The publication of the notice in the newspaper is designed as an incentive for those who owe taxes to pay up before the notice date - a method undertaken for decades and generally accepted as a solid means of convincing late payers to fork it over before hand. County officials have said additional late payers often ante up after the publication of the first notice, hoping they can be deleted from the list in the subsequent publications. The list is published on three consecutive weeks. Parcels that are part of the list are also charged additional fees to

cover the costs of processing and publication.

What the list does not take into account is the recent escalation in property values in Anderson County and the apparent leveling of those prices most recently. Property prices have seen huge gains in recent years as continued low interest loan rates prevailed until recently. But tight supply of available housing, continued to drive home prices and property values higher. The portion of total property values assessed for taxation in the county for the 2025 budget sits at over \$137 million - down about \$181,000 countywide from the year before.

Darell was born Sept 5th, 1940, near Waverly, KS at the family farm to Ralph and Elsie Young. He graduated from Westphalia High School Class of 1958.

Darell joined the Air Force after high school; however, he was discharged when he fell ill with mumps.

Darell married Mary Louise (Schomaker) Dec 10th, 1960, in Piqua, Ks. Darell worked many jobs, Beginning with Ford Motor Co. Garnett, His employment in the electric distribution dept with City of Garnett began April 1969. He worked as a groundman, before becoming a lineman until 1986. He worked for Mersman's as a mechanic before buying and opening his own mechanic shop on Park Road beside Casey's, many who would use this mechanic services were surprised to see he kept live Rattlesnakes in aquariums within his shop. Maybe even telling a few "unsavory characters" he releases them in the shop at night for security.

His health declined making it difficult for him to mechanic full time and he sold his shop. After closing the shop, he spent countless times in his driveway directing and providing his knowledge to his children and grandchildren while they did the work instead of him.

In 2000, he began working for Anderson County, while working for the county he was a familiar face in the summer mowing the county road ditches. During his employment there he won a portion of a lottery jackpot with the rest of the shop "guys" before he retired in Sept 2006. Darell spent the rest of his years enjoying his retirement and doing many of the things he loved. Darell was a jack of all trades and always had a good story or two to pass along if you had the time to sit and listen.

In his younger years he enjoyed raising his children, Sheryl, Russell, Roger and

Karen alongside his wife, Mary. As a family they enjoyed many camping trips where he loved to fish and take everyone out on the boat, and you cannot forget the late night big "Wampus" cat stories he would tell his grandkids so they would go to bed! Darell loved to tease his grand kids and great grands but was a great sport to get it in return. When his health still allowed you could find him every year in Waynoka Oklahoma for the annual Rattlesnake hunts. 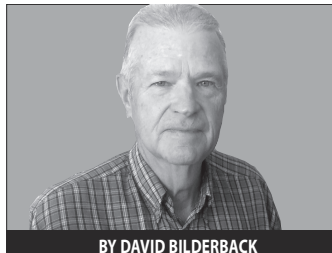
When Ted retired from the Army in 1975, they bought a house in Garnett, Kansas.

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# Dauids supports men in women's sports, but silent on Olympic fiasco



It took just 46 seconds and two staggering blows from a man boxing as a woman in the Paris Olympics to thrust the men-in-women's sports debate onto the world stage last week. But Sharice Davids, the former women's Mixed Martial Arts fighter now representing Kansas' 3rd District in Congress who has often supported "transgender" issue changes in the U.S. that have allowed men to compete against women in women's sports – isn't coming out of her corner on the topic. Twenty-five

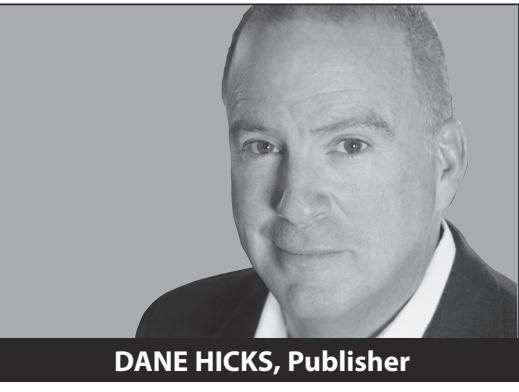


Algeria's Imane Khelif celebrates after defeating Hungary's Anna Hamori.

year-old Algerian Imane Kehlif was disqualified from the 2023 Women's World Championship for ineligibility – not confirmed by the WWC but reported by other sources to have been because he was found to possess a "Y" chromosome in a DNA test and elevated levels of testosterone. Having always represented himself and competed as a female, Kehlif was allowed to compete in the women's division by the International Olympic Committee, which has less stringent eligibility rules. Imane Kehlif lands a punch to the head of Angela Carini

during last week's Olympic women's boxing matchup/Reuters. Kehlif landed two punches on Italy's Angela Carini's face, one nearly dislodging her headgear, that prompted the Italian to immediately quit the fight, saying "I had to preserve my life," after she emotionally broke down in the ring. Kehlif reportedly suffers from a gender deformity which leaves him without functioning male genitalia but with undescended testicles and no ovaries or uterus. The presence of his "Y" chromosome, as well as advanced musculature and other masculine traits, defines him biologically as a man. Asked to comment on her own women's combat sports experience and her pro-LGBTQ positions as the issue stole the Olympics spotlight last week, Congresswoman Davids' office did not reply to questions for this story. The Shawnee Democrat representing Johnson, Miami, Franklin, Anderson and part of Wyandotte counties voted against a bill that would have banned men from competing in women's sports in U.S. schools and colleges in April 2023. As the debate became inflamed worldwide, an initially distraught Carini was later cowed into an apology to Kehlif for the public outrage he

suffered on social media. "I'm sorry for my opponent," she told the Italian sports channel La Gazzetta dello Sport. "If the IOC said she can fight, I respect that decision. It wasn't something I intended to do. Actually, I want to apologize to

Mark Adams said Kehlif was "born female, was registered female, lived her life as a female, boxed as a female, has a female passport." "This is not a transgender case," Adams told reporters. Still, Carini's Olympics prospects have been ended under at best questionable circumstances. Kehlif went on Saturday to defeat Hungarian fighter Luca Anna Hamori, who also defended the Algerian's legitimacy. Taiwanese fighter Lin Yu-Ting, who was also previously disqualified on gender basis by the WWC, also won his first round in the women's 57 kg matchups. At 5'3" and 115 pounds, Davids had a 5-1 amateur record in strawweight women's MMA and a 1-1 professional record before her last bout in 2014. All the fights were against biological females.

So-called "transgender" females – men who claim to be women – fighting actual female competitors in MMA has been an issue for much of the past decade, though only two fighters, the now-retired Fallon Fox and former U.S. Army Special Forces member Alana McLaughlin, are known to have fought organized larger-league MMA. Fox fought six bouts from 2012 to 2014 during the final years of Davids' career, and was called out by one doctor for breaking the skull of one female opponent in a bout. Davids has refused to say whether she would have been willing to fight a man presenting as a female MMA fighter when she was competing. ###

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# Some in GOP have itchy conspiracy trigger fingers

A couple of Oswald's fellow employees were on the floor beneath him and saw cement loosened by the shots fall from the ceiling. All of this is why the police had an accurate

description of Oswald within minutes and why an officer immediately rushed to the depository and found Oswald right after the assassination; he let him go when Oswald's supervisor said he was employed there. Oswald was a good shot during his stint in the Marine Corps, and the longest shot, the third, which killed Kennedy, was only from 88 yards away – considerably closer than Thomas Crooks was to Trump in Butler, Pennsylvania. Moreover, Kennedy's two entrance wounds were from behind -- where Oswald was shooting from. No one who knew anything about Oswald could be surprised. He was a misfit with a history of violence, including trying to assassinate a right-wing general. Would the CIA have recruited Oswald to do its dirty work? It's a fantastical notion. Not only was Oswald an utterly unrel-

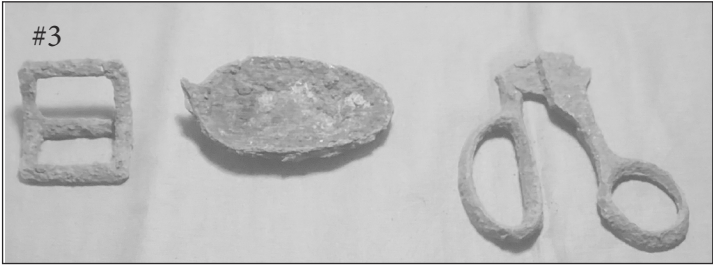
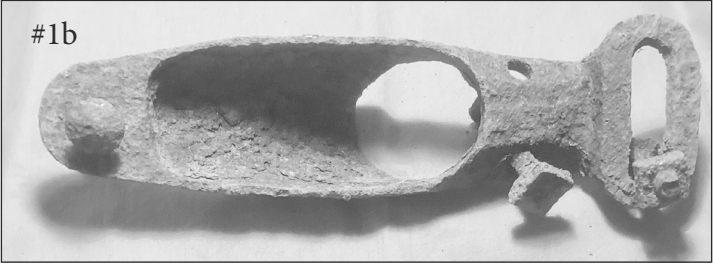
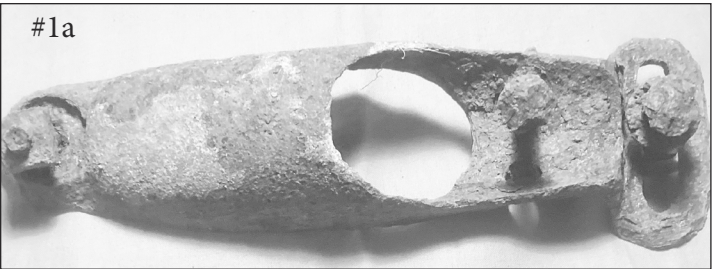

# 60 years ago...New grocery store opened in Harris

Sixty years ago, Aug. 1964

Whether a prank or malicious intent, the effigy of City Manager Howard Rubin, hung from the city call flag pole late Sunday night, did not see the light of day, nor did it fulfill its purpose of ridiculing and belittling Mr. Rubin. At 11:30 Sunday night Police Chief Sam Geer discovered the dummy and placard, then promptly removed the effigy and began investigating the scene. Seats of the stadium at the Garnett city park are sporting a new coat of paint thanks to the Pep Clubbers. The organization composed of about 140 girls did all the painting in three early morning sessions over the last several weeks before the onset of the heat. A new grocery store is being opened in Harris by Russell Davey of Olathe, who will operate it in the Whiteford Building.

Fifty years ago, Aug. 1974

Discussions of the Welda school proper disposal was one of the main items at the Board of Education meeting. After obtaining a title opinion and a survey, the board voted to divide the property and sell the portion of the land that houses a garage and other small out-buildings to the Welda township for \$1. The school building and the land on which it stands will be publicly advertised for sale. Anderson County voters appeared not to take interest in the primary election, with just over a thousand voters show-



ing up at the poll. A weekend of go-kart racing is planned here as the Garnett Jaycees hold their second summer race. Richard Hermann, the chairman, said that about 300 entries are expected for the two days of racing.

Forty years ago, Aug. 1984

According to Maury Harrington, County Extension Director, a two-year-old multi-purpose arena building project at North Park is nearing completion. The project began out of the need for an area with a hard-based surface so that other events besides football could be played at the park. Three days of exhibits and entertainment are planned for the 60th annual Richmond Free Fair, which opens Thursday of this week. After the parade, winners will be announced and trophies presented. Following the awards ceremonies, the Legacy Band from Topeka will play bluegrass and country music.

Thirty years ago, Aug. 1994

"Branson City Limits,"

a little piece of the Branson, MO country music scene, will entertain Anderson County fairgoers. This is the first year the group has toured the fair and festival circuit in the mid-west. USD 365 board members approved the plan to go ahead with a fact-finding expedition into the walls of Garnett Elementary Center to determine if and how badly structural supports in the school have deteriorated over the last 73 years. After suffering months of pounding from transport trucks and thousands of other vehicles while a make-shift detour routed traffic around the newly opened Pottawatomie bridge on US Highway 169, the streets of Greeley may get some help from the Kansas Department of Transportation.

Twenty years ago, Aug. 2004

The Anderson County Commission was informed that plans to renovate the bathrooms at the Community Building would cost at least \$6,000 less than the original estimate. The savings come after discovering that the new bathrooms' heating and air conditioning could be connected to the existing ductwork. Garnett City Commissioners agreed Tuesday night to add \$1,000 from the transient guest fax fund toward a non-profit organization called the Anderson County Corn Festival. The planned event will not only celebrate the local corn crop and harvest but also give the

community an annual festival to develop entertainment. Hope Unlimited sent two domestic violence counselors to meet with local women who requested additional training. The organization provides counseling and shelter for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. During the meeting, the two counselors found that there was a significant gap in services being provided in the Anderson County area.

Ten years ago, Aug. 2014

Two recent ACHS graduates have started a local business that aims to target drunk drivers and keep them off the streets. What began as a joke while Spencer Walter and Cody Getter took an evening cruise has become quite the enterprise. The service where one of the teens drives the intoxicated clientele to their home in a vehicle while the other teen follows in the client's vehicle has made it appealing to many night owls. The two teens say some people will call ahead to pre-arrange their ride. Two Garnett businesses were hit with counterfeit bills Police Chief Kevin PeKarek confirmed last week that the business believed the \$20 bills were counterfeit and one of them caught onto the ruse in time to get a license plate number. Officials say that less high-tech counterfeiters often fake lower denomination bills like 10s and 20s and are easier to spot.

present sheriff's department regarding response times, favoritism alleged to certain individuals and poor morale which Locke said has hampered hiring and continuity in the sheriff's department. Outgoing sheriff Vern Valentine rebutted those charges in his own social media post published several days later.

Locke unceremoniously and publicly dressed Sheahan down at an August 2023 city commission meeting when Sheahan still held his commission post over comments Sheahan had made to then city recreation director Phil Bures

during a week's-long ordeal over Bures' position. Bures eventually resigned his post with the city, and Sheahan was defeated in an April 2024 write-in campaign by sitting commissioner Nate Wiehl.

Sheahan told the Review he had requested an investigation by Anderson County Attorney Elizabeth Oliver regarding the allegations against Locke and said a complaint to the Kansas Attorney General's Office was also a possible avenue. As of Monday afternoon there was no word from the county attorney's office whether that office planned to initiate an investigation.

never worked according to the sales pitch bought into by commissioners, donors and taxpayers who funded a mill levy for the memorial's near \$500,000-plus construction.

Members of the Garnett American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars post made a public statement in April criticizing the fact that the project had taken so long to become operational, and that its full functionality still was not realized after the equipment warranty expired.

County clerk Julie Wettstein said the latest proposed fix still

wasn't expected to make the project function as it was originally promoted and intended. Ventilation in the memorial's turret design, where much of the computer equipment is located, was one of the primary problems, Wettstein said.

"Improved ventilation is a must in the columns and removing as much electronics as possible from the outside weather elements is the priority," she said.

Members of the local veterans posts did not respond to requests for comment by our presstime Monday.

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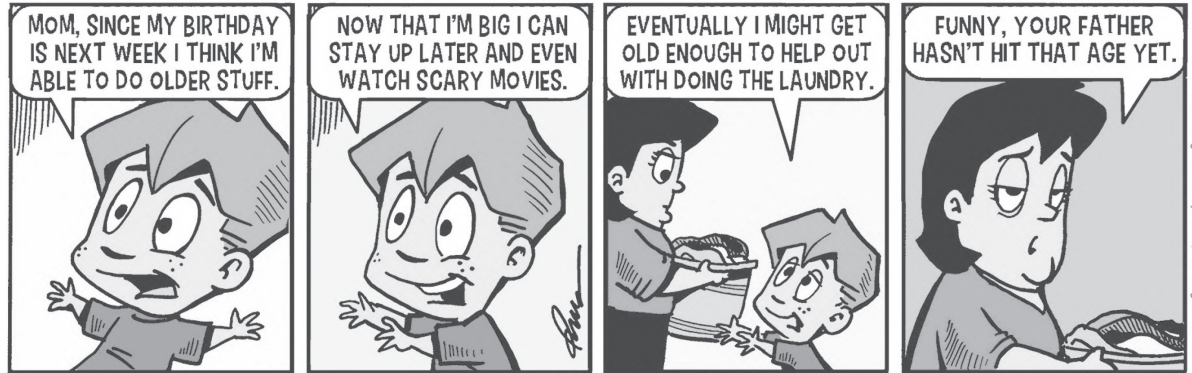
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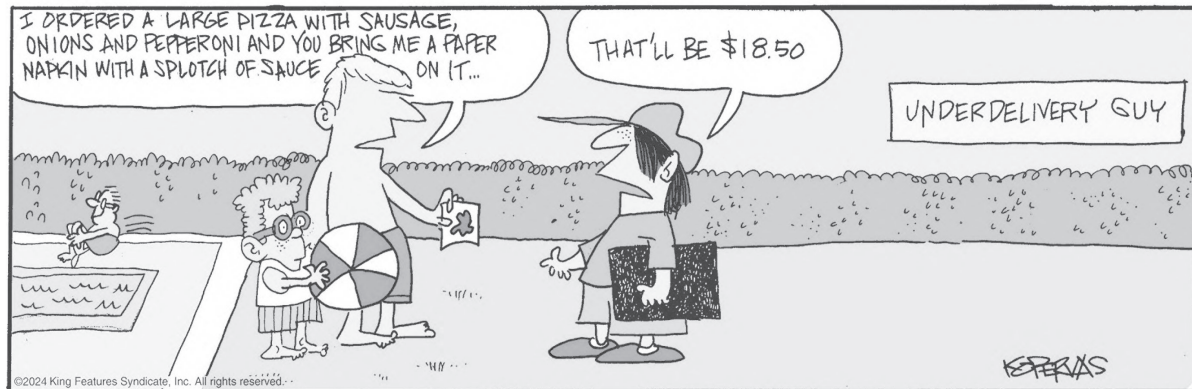

present it. "The resignation letter was handed to you Tuesday last week during closed session," Indovina told Mayor Burke and once received during closed session, you vacated the building, without adjournment...I'm not going to allow Mr. Weiner

to have such a horrible end to his time served as a city leader as an opinion." Weiner left Garnett in 2021 after serving about four years in the city commission post here, finding frequent static with commissioner Greg Gwin over various cost, city operations and personnel issues.

Townpeople rallied publicly at one time to convince commissioners to approve a larger raise and a longer term contract for Weiner which kept him on board after he was recruited by the City of Iola, but he left less than a year later for Monett.

The mill levy is a multiplier which is applied to the portion of property value, or assessed value, owned by private entities in the city. The overall assessed valuation of the city is

the sum of all those individual assessments to which the tax levy is applied. This year that assessed valuation for the city is 33.4 million dollars, up about \$1.5 million from last year due primarily to increasing property values.

The budget summary will be published in next week's Review. The budget hearing will begin at 5:30 p.m. prior to the regularly scheduled city commission meeting on August 27 at city hall.

The next Summer Olympics will be held in Los Angeles in 2028.

What will be the foods and flavors highlighted then when serving the masses?

There's no doubt that during the 2028 Olympics the food professionals tasked with providing an astronomical number of meals will be successful in sourcing from the diverse supply of food produced by America's farmers and ranchers.

There's no doubt that what is produced will meet the

required nutritional needs of these athletes.

There's also no doubt that there will be an abundance of food options as reflected by the variety of agricultural operations one can find throughout the United States.

Whether it's meat, eggs, dairy, fruits, vegetables, cereals, oil seeds, protein crops, fish and aquaculture, and even alcoholic drinks, American agricultural products will be ready to be served.

The Olympics is a place where an exchange of cultures takes place every four years. I can't wait until 2028 when the vast diversity of our American agricultural products play an integral role in the feeding and fueling of the most elite athletes from around the world as they go for the gold.

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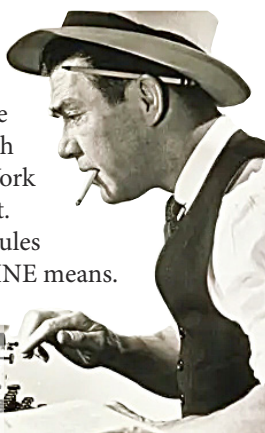

# Helping kids back into the school routine

As the summer comes to a close and school is getting back into session, here are a couple quick reminders to help make the transition from the beach to the classroom easier for you and your child.

### Validation

Let your child know that his nervous or apprehensive feelings about the start of school are normal. All kids (and adults!) have a hard time getting back into the routine of the school year. The knowledge that he is not alone in this experience will help your child feel he's being heard and understood.

### Morning Routines

A common change that

occurs as we begin the school year is a new morning routine. To help your child be successful, discuss what her morning routine will look like during the school year. This way, your child knows what will be happening and has clear expectations that are valuable to her under the time pressure of getting ready for school. Provide your child with simple, well-defined, and easy steps for her routine so that she has a clear idea of what you expect and so that it's easy to follow along with you! Having an easy-to-reference schedule, maybe with pictures, can engage your child and provide a wonderful visual

guide for what she needs to do next. Giving specific praise when she completes each lets her know that you love what you're seeing. This will increase your child's chances of success in the future, and helps build her self-esteem.

### Homework

Another transition that can be rough after a summer break is homework completion. Like the morning routine, providing your child with a structured schedule can help him stay focused and motivated. Completing homework as soon as school is over and with continuous parental support will take advantage of the daylight hours and provide encour-

agement, motivation, and assistance when needed. Snacks are a great way to keep your child's energy up while he works through those tough math problems. Of course, some children have active schedules, with team sports, music classes, or afterschool clubs, which can make engaging in homework more difficult. Letting your child know that you understand the hard work he is putting in and being ready with frequent positive feedback for his effort can help motivate him to get homework done.

### Bedtime

Bedtime is one of the hardest transitions. Children may be accustomed to going to sleep later and/or waking up later during the summer, so the new school schedule can be difficult to get acclimated to. As with the morning routine, having a nighttime schedule can assist in creating a structure for your child. Set your child up for success with clear expectations, simple step-by-step instructions, and praise at the completion of each step. Additionally, visual reminders can help your child have something to refer to as she goes about her routine. Most kids want more time watching their favorite TV show or finishing that last level of a videogame, and setting time limits can be a great way to put a boundary around the winding down time that they need each evening.



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
